Having a just Sense of the great Advantage secured to our Religion and Liberty by the Continuance of your Majesty's Royal Line on the Throne of these Kingdoms, most humbly beg Leave to express our dutiful and sincere Congratulations to your Majesty on the safe Delivery of her Royal Highness the Princess, and the Birth of a Prince.

We particularly feel and acknowledge on this joyful Occasion, how much we owe to your Majesty's Wisdom and Goodness in your happy Choice of a Consort for his Royal Highness the Prince of Wales; and we hope, by the Blessing of God, to see their Royal Offspring grow up to be a Comfort to your Majesty, and to Them, and a Pledge of future Felicity to your People.

Hague, Aug. 22, N. S. New Conferences have this Week been held by the Imperial, British, and French Ministers, with the Deputies of the States, concerning the Affair of Juliers and Berg; at which the Imperial and French Ministers delivered to Mr. Trevor and the Deputies fresh Memorials. The States of Holland are to separate To-morrow. M. Ginkel is arrived here from the Court of Berlin: The King of Prussia having conferred upon him his Order of Knighthood, he has asked Leave of the States to wear the Ensigns of that Order, which their High Mightinesses have granted. Prince George of Hesse Cassel is expected here from Loo, where he has been to visit the Prince and Princess of Orange. By Letters from Stockholm of the 1st Instant, we learn, that the King of Sweden had been extremely ill, but was then judged to be out of Danger, and in a fair Way of Recovery. There are Letters from Petersbourg of the 2d Instant, which advise, that it was rumour'd that there had been a second Action between Felt Marshal Munich and the Turks near the River Lavrin, upon the Frontier of Poland.

John Carter is a tall thin Man, of a pale Complexion, and is lame of one Foot which turns inwards; he is a Wash-Graver by Trade, formerly kept an Ale-house

house in West-Smithfield, but lodged last at the Duke's Head in St. John's Square.

Francis Kelham, a little Man with a red Complexion, who keeps the Rose and Crown Ale-house in Bartholomew Close, till he absconded. They have both been frequently seen at Horse Races, Gaming-Tables, Hazard, and Cockfighting Matches. Whoever apprehends either of the said Persons, or any other Person concerned in these Practices, may apply themselves to Mr. Alston, in Surry-street in the Strand, or to Mr. North, near Fishmongers-Hall, in Thames street.
