As for our Artillery, it is believed there never was any better ferved, or in greater Order; nor can any Army make a more warlike Appearance, or shew more regular useful Discipline; in an Alarm whole Regiments turn out almost as soon as Picquets. As the Carriages for our Baggage, and for our Provisions to sublist near 200,000 Persons some Months, are very numerous, they are disposed in the several Parts of the Army in the most proper Manner for Security and for Ser-
