Etters from the Imperial Army of the 20th past relate, that the Body of 3 or 4000 Turks which had attacked the Rear-Guard of the Imperial Horse as they were about to pass the Save on the 17th, having been put to Flight by Mafor General Caraffa with only two Regiments of Imperialists, neither they, nor any other of the Enemies Forces, had appeared again after that Day. The Grand Duke of Tuscany having left the Camp of Semlin to teturn to Vienna, Felt Marshal Konigsegg went to that Camp on the toth leaving the went to that Camp on the 19th, leaving the Command of the Garrison in Belgrade to Felt Marshal Wallis. On the 20th Prince Charles of Lorrain took up his Residence in the Rascian Archiepiscopal Palace, from which Count Koniglegg had removed to the Camp. The last Letters from the Army are of the 27th of September, and give an Account, that the Generals Philippi and Sehr had quitted the Camp on Account of their Illness, and that Count Kevenhuller was expected. That upon Ad-vice that a Body of 15000 Janislaries ap-peared on the Side of Meadia, with Design, as was thought, to march towards Temefwaer, Orders had been given on the 26th to lay a new Bridge over the Save above Belgrade, by which the Cavalry was ordered to pass that River and afterwards the Danube: That accordingly several Regiments did file off from Semlin on the 20th, and on the 27th the whole Cavalry was actually employed in passing both the Save and the Danube; and it was faid that some Regiments of Foot had likewise received Orders to pass into the Bannat.
