THE following Address having been transmitted to his Grace the Duke of Devonshire, Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, has been presented to his Majesty (in the Absence of his Grace) by his Grace the Duke of Newcastle, one of his Majesty's principal Secretaries of State: Which Address his Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty.

The humble Address of the Mayor, Sheriffs, Citizens, Grand Jury, Gentlemen and Freeholders of the County of the City of Waterford.

WE your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects do with all Humility beg Leave to approach your Majesty with our sincere Congratulations on the late happy Addition of a Prince to your Royal House.

And as the Increase of your illustrious Issue endow'd with your eminent Virtues, is the most perfect Assurance that we can have of conveying to Posterity those inestimable Blessings which your Majesty's wife and just Administration has secured unto us; We therefore, with the utmost Sense of Duty and Gratitude, join our most earnest Wishes for a long Continuance of your Majesty's Reign, to our Hopes of a numerous and prosperous Issue in every Branch of your Royal Family.

Rome, Sept. 20, N. S. The King of Naples has ordered the Building of a Ship of War of 40 Guns, and 'twas said that four Gallies will also be built for the Squadron of Sicily. The Hereditary Grandees of Spain at Naples, who were not allowed to cover before the King, because they had never been at the Court of Spain, have obtained that Privilege by Leave of his Catholick Majesty, and accordingly they have begun to enjoy it at the Court of Naples; on which Occasion the Duke de Giovenazzo, the Prince di Bassignano, and the Marquess del Vasto, di Caniglia, and di Teraci, kissed the King's

Hand. The Pope, on the Rumour that the Duke of Modena designs to make an Attempt on Ferrara, has ordered thither a Reinforcement of Soldiers. The Grand Duke of Tuscany has asked Leave of the Pope to raise a Contribution on the Ecclesiasticks in his Dominions; to which Request the Pope has not yet consented, 'tis said, on Account of the Dependency of the two Fiefs of Scavolina and Carpegna, which is yet unsettled. Count Rovera is daily expected here as Minister Extraordinary from the King of Sardinia, to confirm the Reconciliation between this Court and that of Turin.

Leghorn, Sept. 24. By Order from the Council of Regency, several Military Officers of this Garrison have been dismiss'd: To some few of them, in Consideration of their Services, a small Pension has been allowed, on Condition that they shall not go out of Tuscany. The Commanders of all the Towers and small Forts along the Sea Coasts are also discharged; instead of whom Sergeants from the neighbouring Garrisons are order'd to take Charge of the said Forts, &c.

Florence, Sept. 29. In Consequence of the Conferences held by M. de Braitewiz at the Council of War, about 80 Tuscan Officers have been dismissed from the respective Fortresses, Garrisons, and Places of Tuscany. On the 19th, M. de Wachtendonck arrived here from Leghorn, in order to forward the military Plan for the new regulating and forming of a Tuscan Regiment, which is to be composed of 17 Companies of 120 Men each, on the German Footing; as well as to consult with the Receiver General of the Grand Duke's Revenues the Manner for supplying regularly the Appointments to the Imperial Troops in Tuscany, to be reimbursed, it is said, to the Grand Duke at Vienna, out of the Emperor's Treasury. On the 20th, M. de Wachtendonck had an Audience of the Electress Dowager Palatine, and on the 25th, attended by two Imperial Officers, whom he brought with him from Leghorn, set out from hence to inspect the Fortresses and Passages on the Mugello and the Bologna Road. On the 15th the Duke of Modena set out from Salsuolo for Massa, by the way of Seravezza.
