**T**HE King of Sweden is now so well, that his Appearance abroad is daily expected.

*Warsaw, Oct. 11, N. S.* A Subaltern Officer who is this Day arrived from the Russian Army, in which he has serv'd in this last Campaign as Volunteer, relates, that he left that Army on their Return in Volhinia.

*Vienna, Oct. 15, N. S.* By Letters from the Imperial Army of the 8th Instant it is advised, that a Lieutenant was sent on the 5th with 30 Men to take Possession of Semendria; but that having learnt in the Way that the Turks had already retaken Possession of that Place, he returned with his Men to Belgrade. The Turks had several Hundred Saicks with them at Semendria, and had likewise taken Possession of all the Ports which they had abandoned on the other Side of the Danube, excepting Panchova; to which last Place 400 Spahis came up on the 6th Instant, but retreated after some Skirmishes with the Imperial Hussars, tho' not without threatening to return speedily accompanied with Janissaries. Such great Rains have fallen as give hopes that the Turks will not be able to approach Sabatz with their Cannon. But they have brought some small Pieces of Artillery up to Raticha, and it is uncertain whether Baron Roth will be able to hold out long, tho' he has 900 Men there under his Command. Mean time, the Prince of Hildburghausen has had Orders sent him to march from Peterwaradin with the Saxons and Bavarians, joined to two Battalions of Imperialists, and five Regiments of Cavalry, in order to succour Raticha, but it was feared it would be too late. It was talk'd among the Officers at Semlin, that our main Army will continue there till the Campaign is ended, unless the Advices of a great Body of Turks gathering in the Bannat shall be so far confirm'd, as to make it necessary for the Imperialists to march thither at any rate; and in this last Case, it

is thought they will take their Winter Quarters in the Bannat.

John Carter is a tall thin Man, of a pale Complexion, and is lame of one Foot, which turns inward; he is a Watch-Graver by Trade, formerly kept an Ale-house in West-Smithfield, but lodged last at the Duke's Head in St. John's Square.

Francis Kelham, a little Man with a red Complexion, who lately kept the Rose and Crown Ale-house in Bartholomew Close, till he absconded. They have both been frequently seen at Horse Races, Gaming-Tables, Hazard, Cockfighting Matches.

David Roberts, by Trade a Carpenter, about 5 Foot 2. or 3 Inches high, of a fairish fresh Complexion, about 35 Years of Age, who kept the Coach and Horses Inn in the City of Coventry about two Years ago, since lodged in Cold Bath Fields, London, afterwards at one Williams, a Chandler on Saffron Hill, afterwards moved and kept a House in the Market-place, Hoxton, from thence moved to the Broad Sanctuary, Westminster, from thence to the Mulberry Garden in St. George's Fields, South-

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work, from thence to Wood's Close near Clerkenwell; his last Habitation was near the Three Hats, Islington.

Joseph Benson, about 5 Foot 6 Inches high, between 60 and 70 Years old, stoops a little, wears a Wig, and his Hair pretty long under it, and is a thin spare Man, born near Navesborough in Yorkshire, by Trade a Gunsmith, noted for making Cross Bowes, formerly lived in Dublin; his last Place of Habitation was at Cats-Hole in St. Catherine's, near the Tower. N. B. Joseph Benson is the Maker of the Engine lately found in the New River, and has made several Engines for milling the Guineas, and is reckoned by the Gunsmiths an ingenious Man at his Business. Whoever apprehends either of the said Persons, or any other Person concerned in these Practices, may apply themselves to Mr. Ashton, in Surry-street in the Strand, or to Mr. North, near Fishmongers-Hall, in Thames street.
