Vienna, Oct. 15, N.S. By Letters from the Imperial Army of the 8th Instant it is advised, that a Lieutenant was sent on the 5th with 30 Men to take Possession of Semendria; but that having learnt in the Way that the Turks had already retaken Pollession of that Place, he returned with his Men to Belgrade. The Turks had leveral Hundred Saicks with them at Semendria, and had likewise taken Possession of all the Ports which they had abandoned on the other Side of the Danube, excepting Panchova; to which last Place 400 Spahis came up on the 6th Instant, but retreated after some Skirmishes with the Imperial Hussars, tho' not without threat-ning to return speedily accompanied with Janissaries. Such great Rains have fallen as give hopes that the Turks will not be able to approach Sabatz with their Cannon. But they have brought some small Pieces of Artillery up to Ratscha, and it is uncertain whether Baron Roth will be able to hold out long, tho2 he has 900 Men there under his Command. Mean time, the Prince of Hildburgshausen has had Orders sent him to march from Peterwaradin with the Saxons and Bavarians, joined to two Batallions of Imperialists, and five Regiments of Cavalry, in order to succour Ratscha, but it was seared it would be too late. It was talk'd among the Officers at Semlin, that our main Army will continue there till the Campaign is ended, unless the Advices of a great Body of Turks gathering in the Bannat shall be so far confirm'd, as to make it necessary for the Imperialists to march thither at any rate; and in this last Case, it

is thought they will take their Winter Quarters in the Bannat.
