*Petersbourg, September 23.*

**T**HE 18th, 19th, 21st, and 22d of this Month, the Czarina has been employed in seeing the Second and Third Regiments of the Foot-Guards, the Regiment of Horse Guards and C dets, exercise; which all performed so well, that her Majesty was extremely pleased.

*Warsaw, Oct. 15, N. S.* The Court has received this Morning a Letter from an Officer they have in Count Munich's Army, in which he says the Russians are now at Bowzdodokow, a Town on the River Bog, out of the Territories of Poland.

*Vienna, Oct. 18, N. S.* By Letters of the 10th Instant from Count Konigsegg, which came by Express, we have Advice, that the whole Army was to march the next Day from Semlin, in order as is believed to resume the Operations of the 27th and 28th past, by passing the Save and the Danube again, and penetrating by Panchova into the Bannat, and this principally with a Design to dislodge the Turks said to be assembled at and near Vivalanka; while Prince Hildburghausen, with the Saxons and Bavarians, two Imperial Battalions, the two Regiments of Wirtemberg, and that of Toulon Dragoons, with two Regiments of Cuirassiers Palfi and Bernes, to joyn all which 6000 Croatsians are said to be in march, shall remain to cover the Frontiers of Sclavonia, and particularly to succour Ratscha. This last Place appeared, by Letters of the 8th, to have suffered but very little from the Fire of the Enemy. Preparations are making for opening the next Campaign early: Orders are already given for buying up all the Corn that can be well spared in those adjacent Countries at a certain Price; and Instructions are drawn up for a Plenipotentiary to go to several Courts of Germany to sollicit Supplies of Men and Money. There seems to be no Doubt but that

the Great Duke of Tuscany and his Consort will make a Tour this Winter to Florence.

*Kensington, October 19.*

This Day Don Sebastian de Carvalho, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Portugal, had his first private Audience of His Majesty, to which he was introduced by his Grace the Duke of Newcastle, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and conducted by John Inglis, Esq; Assistant Master of the Ceremonies.

*Whitehall, October 21.*

His Majesty has been pleased to order a Congé d'Elire to pass the Great Seal of Great Britain, empowering the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Bristol to elect a Bishop of that See, the same being now vacant by the Translation of the Right Reverend Father in God Dr. Thomas Gooch, late Bishop thereof, to the See of Norwich; and also to issue his Letters under his Majesty's Royal Sign Manual, recommending to the said Dean and Chapter the Reverend Joseph Butler, Doctor of Laws, to be by them elected and chosen into the said Bishoprick of Bristol.

John Carter is a tall thin Man, of a pale Complexion, and is lame of one Foot which turns inwards; he is a Watch-Graver by Trade, formerly kept an Ale-house in West-Smithfield, but lodged last at the Duke's Head in St. John's Square.

Francis Kelham, a little Man with a red Complexion, who lately kept the Rose and Crown Ale-house in Bartholomew Close, till he absconded. They have both been frequently seen at Horse Races, Gaming-Tables, Hazard, Cockfighting Matches.

David Roberts, by Trade a Carpenter, about 5 Foot 8 or 9 Inches high, of a fairish fresh Complexion, about 35 Years of Age, who kept the Coach and Horses Inn in the City of Coventry about two Years ago, since lodged in Cold Bath Fields, London, afterwards at one Williams, a Chandler on Saffron Hill, afterwards moved and kept a House in the Market-place, Hoxton, from thence moved to the Broad Sanctuary, Westminster, from thence to the Mulberry Garden in St. George's Fields, Southwark, from thence to Wood's Close near Clerkenwell; his last Habitation was near the Three Hats, Islington.

Joseph Benson, about 5 Foot 6 Inches high, between 60 and 70 Years old, stoops a little, wears a Wig, and his Hair pretty long under it, and is a thin spare Man, born near Naresborough in Yorkshire, by Trade a Gunsmith, noted for making Cross Bows, formerly lived in Dublin; his last Place of Habitation was at Cats-Hole in St. Catherine's, near the Tower. N. B. Joseph Benson is the Maker of the Engine lately found in the New River, and has made several Engines for milling the Guineas, and is reckoned by the Gunsmiths an ingenious Man at his Business. Whoever apprehends either of the said Persons, or any other Person concerned in these Practices, may apply themselves to Mr. Aston, in Surry-street in the Strand, or to Mr. North, near Fishmongers-Hall, in Thames street.

pretty light, with a Paper Mask over his Face. He carried off the five following Bags, viz. Hartford, Peterborough, Horncastle, Louth, and Boston, and likewise took the greatest Part of the Letters out of the Enfield, Ware, St. Ives, and Roytton Bags.

Note, There were two Men at a small Distance from him, suppos'd to be his Accomplices.
