T is confirm'd that the Muscovites have quitted the Territories of Poland; and it is added, that Count Munich is to return to Petersbourg to acquaint the Czarina with his Reasons for his dilatory Retreat thro this Country, and for the miserable State of his Army. By Yesterday's Accounts from Caminiec and the neighbouring insected Country, the Plague rages extremely, and advances towards this Capital: It is now

Hague, Nov. 4, N. S. Letters from Vienna bring little more than the Confirmation that the few Turks who are left in the Emperor's Territory, retreat nearer and nearer to their own Frontiers; and that the Imperialists are extending themselves as well in the Ban net, as on the Save, in order to settle the proper Posts of Desence, and take their Quarters, for the Winter. These Letters add, that the Death of Colonel Count Cornberg, who surrendred Orsova, has not stopt the Enquiry ordered to be made into his Behaviour on that Occasion, but his Process is carrying on now. When he died on the 30th of September at Belgrade, it was debated among the chief Officers there, whether he should be buried with the military Ho nours due to a Colonel, seeing his Conduct, though questionable, was not their brought under Examination, nor Sentence pronounced upon it: An Expedient was found, a Battallion of Foot attended his Body to the Grave; but then the Drums beating a Retreat, they march'd off without firing.
