Ratisbonne, April 18. For these several days past the Troops of the Circle of Franconia have been marching to the general Rendezvous which is appointed at Wurenburgh. Yellerday was to be the general Multer, in order to which, the Prince of Baden Dourlack, Welt-Marshal General of the Army of the Empire, was to be likewise present there. Several Princes of the Empire are raising Men in all these parts; it is said, that the Elector of Bavaria intends to have on foot this Summer, an Army of 20000 Men. The news we had where of the Emperors fickfiels is wholly contradicted, and feems to have been only some malicious invention. The matter of Mediation between the Elector of Brandenburgh and several Princes of the Empire, is still at a stand. Several complaints have been made in the Dyet, of the great dammage occasioned to many parts of the Empire, by the march of the Troops at present on

- Dantzick, April's 5. Our Lettersfrom Warfam of the seventh instant tell us, That the Pyet had resolved To raife forthwith a Fonds capable or maintaining an Army of 60000 Men on foot, but that they had not as then agreed on the way to do it. The great preparations of the Turks very much allarme rhem, infomuch, that the Grand General Sobietski hath proposed in The Senate, that they should for this year pay the Tri--bate, flipulated by the late Treaty's to the Grand Signior, that they might have leifure to put themfeles into a better politire of defence, then they are that prefent, which the refeof the Senators would by no fiedns hear of, thinking, not without reason, that it would too much reflect upon the Honour of the Kingdom, to have it at any time faid, that it had been Tributary to the Turk: however the Chians; which was here, is dispatched in a very friendly manner, with a Present of 1000 Distats for himself, and an other for the Grand Vizier, as likewife with a promise, that the King will very suddainly fend an Extraordinary Embally to the Port. The Archbithop of Gnefne is fal-Ien into a Relapie, and now there is but very little hopes of his recovery; The Bithop of Cuiavia basegot the Kings promise to be his Successor, very constrary to the Vice-Chancellors expectation, who in case of vacancy, had promised himself that preferment. One Lumsky a Gentleman, having accused the Archbithop and Grand Marthal, of having berrayed Caminics to the Turks, and not being able to prove the fame, is Sentenced to lose his Head. We have just now Letters of the . I - inflant from Warfaw, and by them have an account, that the Dyet had ordered 50 thousand Dollars to be given to the Grand Marshal, as a reward for his Services, but that because the pub-Tick Treasure is now we'ry low, he hath freely abated one third thereof a on condition the other be paid him, forthwith.

Hambrough, April 21. From Cassed, we are told, that the Bishop of Munster having received advice from his most Christian Majesty, of the Peace concluded with the Elector of Brandenburgh, had accordingly drawn his Troops out of Hervord and Minden, and had ordered them to march towards Westphalia. The Brandenburgh Troops lye still in the Diocess of Halberstadt and Macgdenburgh, and the Imperial Troops spread themselves towards Meyssen, Thuringen, Gr. The Swedes pass daily down the Elbe towards the Stift Bremen; and this day we have advice of leveral Velfels that are arrived in the Elbe, under the Convoy of threemen of War, with Souldiers from Sweden, who are to be Landed at Stad! The Heer d'Amerongen the Dutch Minister is still here, bur intends about the beginning of the next week, to set forward on his jour,

Cylogne, April 14 Our advices of the 17 inflant From Coblems give us an account of above 80 large Vel-Tels that lay there, having on board Teveral thousand French, being deligned down the Rhync towards Wejel.
