We have had a Report ever since the last Post, of the Arrival of a Turk of Consideration at Belgrade, with Letters for the Duke of Lorrain, Felt Marshal Koniglegg, and Felt Marshal Wallis. He came, it is faid, with a Guard of 30 Spahis, and a Tent and other things proper for his Reception were faid to have been immediately prepared for him.
