**T**HE Letters of the 24th past N. S. from the Army, are dated from the Camp near Panchova, from whence it was thought they would remove as on the 26th or 27th towards Opova, and stay there eight Days for the Sake of consuming the Forage in that Neighbourhood. In the mean while, the Fortifications of Panchova were demolishing; and Vivalanka, which Colonel Berenclau found demolished, is to remain so. Letters of the 22d past, N. S. from Transilvania, mention a new Alarm on the Side of Porta Ferrea, towards which Place 500 Horse and a Regiment of Hussars had been sent from the Camp upon the Maros, who were to be supported by all the Forces under Prince Lobkowitz. The Prince of Bevern, Nephew to the Empress, and Prince Charles of Lorraine, have both left the Army, but have been refused any Indulgence with respect to the Quarantine; so that they will hardly be here before Christmas. The Bavarians and the Saxons have the Permission to retire immediately into Winter Quarters, without being confined to garrisoned Towns; this is not only agreeable to their respective Conventions, but the particular Reason which is given for it, is, that unharass'd and unfatigu'd as they are, and will be during the Winter, they may be the first to take the Field the next Year. We have had a Report ever since the last Post, of the Arrival of a Turk of Consideration at Belgrade, with Letters for the Duke of Lorraine, Felt Marshal Konigsfegg, and Felt Marshal Wallis. He came, it is said, with a Guard of 30 Spahis, and a Tent and other things proper for his Reception were said to have been immediately prepared for him.

The Person who committed this Robbery, is described to be a middle-siz'd Man, had on a light-colour'd close bodied Coat, with close Sleeves, and a full Bob Wig pretty light, with a Paper Mask over his Face. He carried off the five following Bags, viz. Hartford, Peterborough, Horncastle, Louth, and Boston, and likewise took the greatest Part of the Letters out of the Enfield, Ware, St. Ives, and Royston Bags.

Note, There were two Men at a small Distance from him, suppos'd to be his Accomplices.
