*Petersbourg, October 14.*

**P**RINCE Dolgoroucky is arrived here from Moscow, and is soon to set out for England with his eldest Son.

*Warsaw, Nov. 1, N. S.* The Plague continues to rage in and about Kamienieck, and by several Reports is said to spread far into the Country, which is the more credible from the little Caution that is taken to prevent it. There are indeed three small Detachments posted on the High Roads from that City to this, but besides the Facility of avoiding them, they are so corruptible, that none but ignorant and indigent Strollers are stoppt. The Primate, Great General, and Great Marshal are all three dangerous ill.

*Vienna, Nov. 5, N. S.* Letters from the Army of the 28th past N. S. give an Account of Count Wallis's Arrival on the 24 h at Panchova with the Letters mentioned in our last to have been brought by a Turkish Officer, and which the latter had not given out of his Hands, as is said, but after many Persuasions. The same Day the said Officer was sent back by the Way of Krotzka with his 30 Spahis. The Demolition of Panchova was finished on the 26th, and certain Canals and other Works made at a very great Expence by the late General Mercy for the Communication of the Temes, the Sereniffa and the Danube, have been likewise ruin'd, in order to hinder the Enemy from entering into those Waters with their Saicks. On the 27th the Army march'd towards the new Camp at Opova, but the Cavalry not being able to get up, remain'd a League and a half behind. On the 28th the Army arriv'd at a Camp near Sakoley, where it was thought they might stay two Days in order to review the Infantry.

*Copenhagen, Nov. 8, N. S.* The Royal Family is now settled for the Winter at Fridericksbourg, where the Council assembled Yesterday, and there was a Court as usual. At Dinner the Queen of Denmark was taken ill, and forced to leave the Table somewhat abruptly; but it is assured at Court that her Majesty slept well last Night, and finds herself to Day much better.

*Dublin, October 31.*

Yesterday being His Majesty's Birth-day, the great Guns were fired at the Barracks, and answered by Volleys from the Regiments in Garrison, which were drawn out upon Oxmantown Green. At Noon there was a numerous Appearance of the Nobility, and other Persons of Distinction, at the Castle, to compliment their Excellencies the Lords Justices upon this Occasion; before whom a Song was perform'd. After which their Excellencies, attended by the Guard of Battie-axes and a Squadron of Horse, made a Tour round St. Stephens Green. In the Evening there was a Play given by their Excellencies for the Entertainment of the Ladies; and the Night concluded with Bonfires, Illuminations, and all other Demonstrations of Joy.

General Post Office, London, August 27, 1738.

*Whereas the Post-Boy carrying the North Mail from London, was set upon and robbed by a single Person on Foot, this Morning between the Hours of Two and Three, on this Side Kingstand, near London: The Postmaster General thinks proper to make it publicly known, That whoever shall apprehend the Person who committed this Robbery, will, upon Conviction, be entitled to a Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, besides the Reward by Act of Parliament for apprehending of Highwaymen: Or if any Accomplice in the said Robbery, shall make a Discovery of the Person who committed the Fact, such Accomplice will be entitled to the said Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, and also have his Majesty's most gracious Pardon. *The Person who committed this Robbery, is described*

*to be a middle-siz'd Man, had on a light-colour'd close bodied Coat, with close Sleeves, and a full Bob Wig pretty light, with a Paper Mask over his Face. He carried off the five following Bags, viz. Hartford, Peterborough, Horncastle, Louth, and Boskon, and likewise took the greatest Part of the Letters out of the Enfield, Ware, St. Ives, and Roylton Bags.*

*Note, There were two Men at a small Distance from him, suppos'd to be his Accomplices.*

General Post-Office, Nov. 1, 1738.

*Whereas a Bank Bill, D. No. 3848, dated the 12th of September, 1738, for the Sum of 23 l. 10 s. 2 d. payable to Anna Stalker, or Order, three Days after Sight, was stolen out of the Bristol Mail upon the 13th of September last, and was brought to the Warehouse of Mess. Bigot and Godin, on Monday the 30th of last Month, by one who pretended his Name was George Willis, and bought of the said Bigot and Godin, by their Servant David Delavaux, Nineteen Yards of white Paduasoy, at the Price of 9 s. 6 d. per Yard, which came to 9 l. 11 s. 6 d. which he paid to the said Delavaux by delivering to him the Bank Bill aforesaid, receiving the Overplus of 23 l. 10 s. 2 d. after the Deduction of the 9 l. 11 s. 6 d. The said George Willis is described to be a Man between the Age of 20 and 30, of a middle Size, and had on a Drab colour Coat and a Bob Wig, and said he lived at a Merchant's near Tower Hill, that dealt in Spicery, which, upon Enquiry, appears to be false.*

*The Post-Master-General therefore thinks it proper, upon this Occasion, to publish this Advertisement concerning the said George Willis, describ'd as above, looking upon him as a Person who either robb'd the Bristol Mail himself, or was concern'd as an Accomplice in the Robbery; and that what has been already publish'd may be again made known, that upon the Conviction of the Principal or Principals in the Robbery, such Principal or Principals being convicted thereof, the Person who shall make the Discovery of him or them, will be entitled to the Reward of 200 l. for each of them, who shall be so convicted as Principals or Accessories, besides the Rewards provided by Act of Parliament for apprehending of Highwaymen. And any Accomplice or Accomplices in the said Robbery, who shall make a Discovery as aforesaid of the Person or Persons who have committed the said Robbery, will be entitled to the Rewards aforesaid, and further, have the Benefit of his Majesty's most gracious Pardon.*
