Which Address his Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty.

The humble Address of the High Sheriff, Grand Jury, Justices of the Peace, and Gentlemen Freeholders of the County of Corke.

WE your Majesty's most Dutiful and Loyal Subjects beg Leave to approach your Royal Person, and to express a just Sense of that Joy which fills the Breasts of all your Majesty's Subjects, on every Increase of your Royal Family.

Your Majesty's Justice, Wisdom and Moderation are but number'd among your other Kingly Virtues, on which we reflect with the highest Satisfaction, and make us earnestly wish for the Prosperity of your Majesty's Reign, and that you may long continue to be the Defender of the Protestant Religion, the Protector of our Liberty, and the Guardian of our Property.

The Birth of a Prince enlarges the Hopes of your faithful Subjects, that one of your Royal House (animated by your Majesty's great Example) may always rule over these Kingdoms, and deal out Blessings to our Posterity with your Majesty's Paternal Care.

Berlin, Nov. 11, N. S. The King and Queen of Prussia are removed from Wusterhausen to Cossenblatt, which is nine German Miles from hence, and are not expected in Town before the Middle of next Month.

Whereas Information has been given upon Oath, That Anthony Silk, of Peckham, in the Parish of Camberwell, in the County of Surrey, was on the Second of this Instant November, between the Hours of Five and Six in the Evening, violently assaulted in a Field, commonly called the North Field, in the Parish aforesaid, and wounded in a barbarous Manner, by two Persons unknown (one of them a tall Man, the other low of Stature, a third standing at a small Distance, supposed to belong to them) and robbed of Wares worth in Silver, some Halfpence, and his Coat, Hat and Wig, &c. and left for dead : For the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the said Crimes, His Majesty is pleased to promise his most gracious Pardon to any one of them, who shall discover his Accomplice or Accomplices, so as he or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
