*Stockholm, October 31.*

**Y**esterday Morning the Treaty of Subsidies between this Court and that of France, was signed by the five Commissaries appointed to settle it with M. St. Severin, who the same Afternoon dispatched the Chevalier Crepi with it to France.

*Copenhagen, Nov. 15, N. S.* The Queen of Denmark is happily recovered of her late Indisposition, and dines in publick again as usual. A Regulation of Quarantain is printed, being the same in Substance with that appointed last Year; only the suspected Ports, which were then comprehended under a general Denomination, are now particularly mention'd; these Ports (besides Dantzick and Konigsberg) are, Elbing, Pillaw, Libow, Memel and Window. Major General Walter, who commanded the Regiment of Foot Guards, is made Governour of the Citadel of Copenhagen, vacant by the Death of Lieutenant General Scheel; and M. Prætorius has succeeded the former in the Command of the Guards.

*Warsaw, Nov. 12, N. S.* The Officer of Distinction who brought the Letter from the Son of the Kan of the Tartars, has promised to deliver to the Republick several Poles found Prisoners among the Russians that the Tartars have taken; as likewise to compensate all Damages committed by their Troops, when a just Estimate can be made of them. The Russians and Turks have made like Promises. Count de Utterocht, who is to succeed Baron Loos in England, has obtain'd Permission to defer his Journey till next Spring. This Day the Primate died.

*Vienna, Nov. 15, N. S.* The Army is either broken up, or upon the Point of separating. Count Koniglegg has sent a Plan for the Winter Quarters, which has been approved by the Emperor with some few Alterations. His Imperial Majesty goes this Day to Cloister Nieuburg, where the Festival of St. Leopold is celebrated annually; upon which Occasion, and on Account of a great Hunting in that Neighbourhood, the Court will be absent about three Days. The Empress goes with him, tho' to remain only in her Chamber during that Time. An Order of the Council of War has been published in the Army, to forbid any Person, upon Pain of Death, to pass the Places marked for the Quarantain; and every Body was to be visited at the passing of the Tibiscus, in order to hinder the Contagion from spreading in Hungary. It is said Felt-Marshal Wallis will have the Command of the Imperial Army the next Campaign. The Emperor has given that General the Command of Belgrade and of Servia, in as full a Manner as it was possess'd by the late Duke of Wurtenburg, and he has

Orders to repair hither as soon as his Quarantain will allow him, to consult and fix the Operations of the next Campaign.

*Whitehall, November 10, 1738.*

Whereas Information has been given upon Oath, That Anthony Silk, of Peckham, in the Parish of Cannibewwall, in the County of Surry, was on the Second of this Instant November, between the Hours of Five and Six in the Evening, violently assaulted in a Field, commonly called the North Field, in the Parish aforesaid, and wounded in a barbarous Manner, by two Persons unknown (one of them a tall Man, the other low of Stature, a third standing at a small Distance, supposed to belong to them) and robbed of Three Shillings in Silver, some Halfpence, and his Coat, Hat and Wig, &c. and left for dead: For the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the said Crimes, His Majesty is pleased to promise his most gracious Pardon to any one of them, who shall discover his Accomplices or Accomplices, so as he or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

General Post Office, London, August 27, 1738.

Whereas the Post-Boy carrying the North Mail from London, was set upon and robbed by a single Person on Foot, this Morning between the Hours of Two and Three, on this Side Kingsland, near London: The Postmaster General thinks proper to make it publickly known, That whoever shall apprehend the Person who committed this Robbery, will, upon Conviction, be entituled to a Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, besides the Reward by Act of Parliament for apprehending of Highwaymen: Or if any Accomplice in the said Robbery, shall make a Discovery of the Person who committed the Part, such Accomplice will be entituled to the said Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, and also have his Majesty's most gracious Pardon. The Person who committed this Robbery, is described to be a middle-sized Man, had on a light-colour'd close bodied Coat, with close Sleeves, and a full Bob Wig pretty light, with a Paper Mask over his Face. He carried off the five following Bags, viz. Hartford, Peterborough, Horncastle, Louth, and Boston; and likewise took the greatest Part of the Letters out of the Enfield, Ware, St. Ives, and Roylton Bags.

Note, There were two Men at a small Distance from him, supposed to be his Accomplices.

General Post-Office, Nov. 1, 1738.

Whereas a Bank Bill, D. No. 3848, dated the 12th of September, 1738, for the Sum of 23 l. 10 s. 2 d. payable to Anna Stalker, or Order, three Days after Sight, was stolen out of the Bristol Mail upon the 13th of September last, and was brought to the Warehouse of Mess. Bigot and Godin, on Monday the 30th of last Month, by one who pretended his Name was George Willis, and bought of the said Bigot and Godin, by their Servant David Delavau, Nineteen Yards of white Paduasoy, at the Price of 9 s. 6 d. per Yard, which came to 9 l. 11 s. 6 d. which he paid to the said Delavau by delivering to him the Bank Bill aforesaid, receiving the Overplus of 23 l. 10 s. 2 d. after the Deduction of the 9 l. 11 s. 6 d. The said George Willis is described to be a Man between the Age of 20 and 30, of a middle Size, and had on a Drab-colour Coat and a Bob Wig, and said he lived at a Merchants near Tower
