Falmouth, April 21.

Esterday came in here the Pearle Frigat, and brought with her a Caper of Flushing, Mounted with 11 Guns and 70 Men, which she took the day before on these Coasts.

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Turin April 8. The Peace being at length concluded, between this State and the Republick of Genoua, by the interposition of the Sieur Giumoni the French Envoy, we have been in daily expectation here to see the same Published, though we now hear, that it hath been hitherto deferred, because of some new difficulties made by the Senate of Genoua, concerning the Ratification of this Treaty. The Sieur Gaumoni is gone for Genouz, to adjust this matter, which we hope he will effect to our satisfaction.

Rome, April 8. The Pope is perfectly recovered again of his late indisposition; There are at present several places vacant in the Sacred Colledge, and notwithstanding we do not as yet hear of any promotion, the Pope intending it seems to expect as long as may be, that so there may be yet more vacancies, and he may be able to gratise muny of his friends together. The Duke of Gravina is going with his Lady for Naples, and hath accordingly taken leave of his Holiness. The King of Poland hath lately written to his Holiness, giving him an account of the Invasion they are threatned with from the Turks this Sun ner, and praying his Holiness assistance against the common Bnemy of Christendome; as yet nothing hath been done therein, more then that the Pope hath ordered an answer to be returned to that King, that he will not be wanting to do all that shall be in his power, for their assistance and preservation.

Genout, April 19. After all the difficulties that have been made in the Treaty between the D. of Stroy and this State, it hath been at length concluded, and published here the 15 instant. The Sieur Grumont the French Envoy, is at present here, and will doubtless return with the thanks of this Republick, for the great endeavours he hath used in the concluding of this Work.

Lipstalt, April 26. We have of late discoursed much of a Treaty concluded between the most Christian King and the Elector of Brandenburgh, but our Letters which we now receive from that Court, will by no means allow thereof, but fay, that his Electoral Highness is not only recruiting his old Troops, but that he hath given out Commissions for the raising of several new Regiments, as well of Horse as Foot, and that besides a considerable body of Men is coming down out of Prusit; The Troops that are at present quartered in the Ferritory of Macgdenburgh and Hilberstidt, have orders to decamp, but whither they are to take their march, we cannot yer certainly learn. Monsieur de Turenne lyes still in his old quarters. We have been here in some apprehention of being Attacked by the Munster and Gologne Troops, upon which Major Genesal Spaen was immediately ordered to repair hither; to take all polible care for the fecurity of the place; and that the might provide whatever he thought wanting, necessary for our desence, he hath received a considerable sum of Money by Bills of Exchange from Berlin. The said General sent out some days since a party of Horse and Foot, to demolish certain Fortifications raised on the Frontiers, by order of the Bishop of Munster; and yet after all, there be those that still report with very great considence, that our Elector hath made a Peaco with the French; we must expect some time to hear the certainty of all.

Cologne, April 28. Yesterday passed by this place four large Vessels laden with French Soldiers, and this day were followed by eighteen others; these Troops pals all down towards Wefel, Nimmegen, &c. and are part old Troops, and part of those that have been raised this year. The Marquis de Grana is still here, expecting, as is faid, more positive Orders from the Court at Vienna, before he be ins his journey, but especially to hear whom the Emperor will appoint his Successor, to Command the Regiment here. Our advices concerning the proceedings of the Elector of Brandenburgh are very uncertain; some assure us, that the Treaty be-tween him and the French is concluded, whilst others speak to the contrary, and say, that he is making all the haste he can, to come into the Field again to affile the Durch; whatever his intentions are, certain it is, the Dutch are very jealous of them and look upon them with an ill Eye. We hear not at present of any action; the French are refreshing themselves in their Quarters, and preparing for the Campagne; Monsieur de Turenne continues still at Soeft, and as we are told, will have his station this Summer on the Rhyn, to obfirve the motions of the Confederates, though in fruth they give no great occasion to apprehend them. The imperial Troops under the Command of the Duke de Bournonville, keep still in the same station; and from Nuremburgh of the 21 instant they write, that there was arrived the Count foannelts, on the part of the Duke de Bournonville, to desire of the States of the Circle of Franconia, Assembled there, Pree Quarters for his Troops, which it feems he had not been able to obtain, the faid States having appointed the Count de Hohenhole to bear their excuse to his Imperial Majesty.

Maestrichi, April 30. On Friday last early in the morning, several Squadrons of French Cavalry appeared within sight of this place, and afterwards approached very near to the Brussels Gate, which forced our People who were at work on the outmost Fortiscations, to retreat into the Town; hereupon all our Garrison was put in Arms, sor we thought nothing more, but that they came with an intention to attack us, though we were afterwards more at ease, when we saw them take their march towards Tongres, and we since hear, that this Body of Horse was Commanded by Monsieur de Montal.

Charletoy, May 1. From Lille of the 29 past they write, that the most Christian King was expected at Arras the 11 of the next month; in the mean time the Signe de 91. Clar hath quitted on Saturday and Friday last, all the Country between the Sambre and the Mense, with all the Cavalry that was quartered in those parts, and is marched to the place appointed for the Rendezvous near Arras.
