THIS Court has received Advice, that the Cham of Crimea and the Budziack Tartars are preparing to attack the Lines in the Ukraine, as soon as the Rivers are frozen hard enough to make them passable for their Horses: As the Russians are well prepared to receive them, they don't seem here to apprehend the Tartars will be able to do them any considerable Damage. The razing of the Fortifications of Oczakow, and the retiring of the Russian Garrison from thence, was not publickly divulged at this Court for a long Time, but now it is own'd, that on the 31st of August last the Garrison blew up all the Mines and Works of that Place, after having lost a great many Men by the Plague, which it seems never fails to be at Oczakow every Summer, but which the Russians were not informed of before; for if they had known it, they would have demolished the Place last Year. As the Russians have also destroyed Kinburn, they have nothing at present on that Side to restore to the Turks, to engage them to make up Matters.

Vienna, Dec. 17, N. S. This Morning the Grand Duke and Duchess of Tuscany, and Prince Charles, set out for Florence; and it is assured that the Grand Duke has given his Word to the Emperour to be back in the beginning of April at farthest.
