A PROCLAMATION.

HEREAS his Majesty has signified unto Us His Royal Pleafure, That the Parliament of this Kingdom, which now stands prorogued to Thursday the Twenty-first Day of this Instant December, be surther prorogued to Thursday the Third Day of May next: We do therefore publish and declare, That the said Parliament be, and accordingly the said Parliament is hereby surther prorogued to Thursday the third Day of May next: Whereof the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Commons in this present Parliament are to take Notice accordingly.

Given at his Majesty's Castle of Dublin, the Sixteenth Day of December, 1738. By their Excellencies Command, Tho. Tickell. GOD save the KING.

On Christmas Day the King, the Duke, the three Princesses Amelia, Caroline, and Mary, with the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, and several Persons of Quality and Distinction, received the Holy Sacrament in the Royal Chapel at St. James's; the Communion Office being personned by the Right folved on.

Warfaw, Dec. 17, N. S. The King having recovered from his late Indisposition, appeared in publick the 13th, and received the Compliments of Congratulation from the first Persons of Distinction. After which his Polish Majesty, together with the Queen and their Royal Highnesses the Princesses, asfisted at divine Service in the Cathedral Church. Upon his Majesty's Return from thence, the Court and Crown Treasurer M. Sedlniecki, and the Starost M. Migezinski took the usual Oath of Senator, the first in Quality of Palatin, and the latter in that of Castellan of Podlachia. After this the Palatin of Mazovia, Poniatowski, who was lately obliged by a Fit of the Gout to defer his Journey, took his Leave of the King in order to go to his Estate for six Weeks to settle his private Affairs. On the 15th the Son of the late Grand Master of Lithuania, Count Sapieha, had the Honour to deliver to the King the Blue Ribbon which his Father wore, and accompanied it with a fuitable Compliment; after which he had the Ho-nour to kis his Majesty's Hand. Count Wratislaw, the Emperour's Ambassadour, has presented a Memorial, desiring the Continuance of the Saxon Auxiliary Troops against the Turks, on the same Conditions they have hitherto been granted. No fixed Resolution has as yet been taken upon it, but it is supposed that a favourable one will soon be re-
