Vienna, January 3, N. S.

ON Monday last, the Emperour being present in Council, Field Marshal Count Harrach appeared and took the usual Oath as President of the Aulick Council of War. After the Council was risen, his Excellency was conducted by Count Sinzendorf, the Emperour's Great Chamberlain, in a Coach with Six Horses, to the Apartment of the Palace where the Council of War is held: At his alighting from the Coach, his Excellency was received by Felt Marshal Kevenhuller, Vice President of the said Council of War, and by the other Felt Marshals, General Officers, and Counsellors of War; who accompanied him to the Room where the Council is held. There Count Sinzendorf making a Speech on the Occasion, presented him to the Board, in the Name of his Imperial Majesty, in the Quality of President, and he took his Place accordingly. Then the Vice President Kevenhuller made a short Speech to him on the Part of the Council, to which his Excellency returned an obliging Answer, and received each Councillor's Compliments. And then the whole Council accompanied Count Sinzendorf back to his Coach. The Emperour has given the Command of the vacant Regiment of Foot of Furstenbusch to Prince Waldeck, that of Jorger of Dragoons to Baron Romers, and that of Dragoons of Prince Ferdinand of Bavaria to Count Preysing. The Count de Perouse, the Bavarian Minister, who is order'd hither from the Court of Munich, having chosen to come down the River at this bad Season of the Year, is not yet arrived, but is expected daily. The Empress, who has been indisposed for some Days past, with a Cold, is so well recover'd, that it is hoped she will be able to appear in

Whitehall, December 29, 1738.

Whereas at a Sessions of Oyer and Terminer, held for the Jurisdiction of the Admiralty of England, on Friday the 10th Day of November last at the Old Bailey, James Buchanan was convicted of a Murder committed upon the High Seas, and was ordered to be Executed for the same on Wednesday the 20th Day of this Instant December, at Execution Dock in Wapping; but before the said James Buchanan had hung the usual Time, some evil-disposed Persons cut him down, and carried him away; and there being Reason to believe that the said James Buchanan was not fully executed, as the Law requires, but is now living; For the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the rescuing of the said James Buchanan, His Majesty is pleased to promise his most gracious Pardon to any one of them, (except the Person or Persons who actually cut the said James Buchanan down) who shall discover his Accomplice or Accomplices, so as he or they may be apprehended and convicted hereof.
