His Majesty in Council was this Day pleased to appoint Thomas Hardy, Esq; to be Sheriff of the County of Warwick.

*Petersbourg, Jan. 6.* General Botta arrived here three Days ago from Vienna, in order to concert Measures for the next Campaign.

*Warsaw, Jan. 29, N. S.* We are assured by all Accounts from the infected Country, that the Contagion is greatly abated, and that at Kaminieck and Tramboula it has entirely ceased; of which it is said that the Great General of Poland is so thoroughly convinced, that he has put into the first of those Places a fresh Garrison of 500 Men.

*Berlin, Jan. 31. N. S.* His Prussian Majesty is so well recover'd of his late Indisposition, that he appeared on the 26th and 27th, on Horseback. On the 28th his Majesty removed from hence to Potsdam. The same Evening M. Berckentin, his Danish Majesty's Minister to the Court of Vienna, arrived here. The Prince Royal of Prussia was taken, a few Days ago, extremely ill with a Cholick in his Stomach; and it was so very violent for the Time it lasted, that his Royal Highness was thought in some Danger; but the Medicine order'd by the Physicians having had a proper Effect, his Royal Highness is now perfectly well again. On Thursday last, Baron Brackel, the Muscovite Minister, set out on his Journey to Vienna; as did on Friday last Baron Ehrencrone for Warsaw, who has resided here some Years as charged with the Affairs of Sweden; he being appointed his Swedish Majesty's Minister to the King and Republick of Poland, in the Room of M. Rodensfield, who is come hither in the same Quality.
