## Florence, January 26, N.S.

N the 20th Instant, about Four in the Afternoon, the Great Duke, the Great Dutchefs, and Prince the Great Dutchefs, and Prince Charles of Lorrain, arrived at the Marquels Corfi's Villa, about two Miles from this City; whither the Minilters with many Ladies and Noblemen, went to congratulate their Royal Highneffes on their Arrival in Tuscany. The Electores Dowager Palatine, attended by the Gentlemen and Ladies of her Court, went thither to compliment their Highnelles, and was received with great Marks of Diftinction. The Princels Eleonora being indifposed at Pontadera, had sent a Gentleman of her Court to Scarperia to com-pliment their Highneffes. About Ten in the Evening their Royal Highnefles, attended by the Great Duke's Body Guards, made their publick Entry into this City. The Senare was in waiting at the Gate to receive and to prefent the Key to the Great Duke, when the Guns of the Caftles were fired, the Lorrain Regiment of Foot Guards being drawn Their up without the Gate of the City. Royal Highnesse proceeded from thence to the Cathedral Church, where the Archbifhops and Bifhops, the Senaté, and a great Number of Noblemen and Ladies were to receive their Royal Highneffes. Te Deum was lung, and the Illuminations begun throughout the City. Thence they proceeded to the Palace, where the Senate and Nobility were ready to re-The Electoreis Dowager Paceive them. latine waited in their Royal Highneffes Apartment, and there again complimented them, who a little while afterwards returned her the Vilit. At pating through the City, an Officer on Horfeback followed the Great Duke, and threw Money to the Populace. On the 21st their Royal Highnesses with Prince Charles of Lorrain and the Prince d'Elboeuf, attended by the Great Officers and Guards, went in a publick Manner to visit the Church of the Annunciation, and in the Evening to see the Opera. The same Day a general Pardon was published throughout the City, to all Briloners, except those for Capital Crimes. That Evening a Courier That Evening a Courier was difpatched to Vienna to acquaint the Emperor with their Highneffes fafe Arrival and publick Entry into Florence. On the 22d the Foreign Ministers were pre-fented to their Royal Highness, as were the Archbishops and Bishops, who came hi-ther to attend and pay their Duties to their Highneffes; who dine and fup every Day in Publick, and receive very gracioufly the Nobility, who conftantly frequent the Court. Madam de Fixin, the Great Dutchels's first Lady of Honour, has a publick Table for the Ladies, as M. de Stenville, the Great Chamberlain, has for the Gentlemen. The fame Day his Highness gave Audience to the

Secretary of State, and other Tuscan Minifiters. On the 24th the Earl of Sandwich, Lord Augustus Fitz-Roy, and many other English Gentlemen, were presented by Mr. Mann to their Royal Highness, and were received with particular Marks of Distinction. On the 25th the Court went into Mourning for a Fortnight, for the Death of Duka Ferdinand of Bavaria : Their Royal Highness went to see the Chapel of St. Lawrence. This Day a Council of State and War was held at Court.
