IIS Majefty came this Day to the Houfe of Peers, and being in His Royal Robes, feated on the Throne with the ufual Solemnity, SirCharles Dalton, Gentleman-Uther of the Black Rod, was fent with a Meflage from His Majefty to the Houfe of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the Houfe of Peers; the Commons being come thither accordingly, His Majefty was pleafed to give the Royal Affent to,

Petersbourg, February 3. The 28th of laft Month being the Czarina's Birth-day, who then entred into the 47th Year of her Age, all the Foreign Ministers and Perfons of Distinction had the Honour to make their Compliments to her Majesty in the Morning; at Night there was a Ball and a fine Firework played off. Baron Keyserling set out from hence the 29th of last Month in order to return to Warsaw, her Majesty having made him a Present of 10000 Rubbles; and General Fleming followed him last Friday. Felt Marshal Lacy is still here, waiting the Arrival of Count Munich, who is soon expected. This being the Czarina's Name-day, there was a fine Appearance of Gentry at Court to make their Compliments to her Majesty. At Night the Town was finely illuminated, and there was a Ball at Court.

## Bank, 14 December, 1738.

Upon a Reprefentation from His Majefty's Poftmafter-General, That it is apprehended that the Expetitation of finding Bank Bills in the Letters, gives Encouragement to the frequent Robbery of the Mails; The Bank of England, to contribute what in them lies to put a Stop thereto, and to render their Bills of no Significancy or Value to thole who are guilty of fuch flagitious Practices, do declare, That for the Benefit and Security of thole who have Occasion to transatt Money Affairs in the Country, they will from and after the First Day of January next (instead of Three Days Sight Bills) give to Juch as defire the fame, their Bills payable at Seven Days after Sight to Order, whereby in Case of a Robbery, the Proprietors will have Time to give Notice thereof; and if the Indorfements are duly filled up, as they expect they fhould, they can be of no Use or Service but to the right Owners.

And whereas they may fall into those Hands who may be ignorant of the Form of indersing them, a Blank Indersement will be printed on the Back for the Parties to fill up, and to be repeated as often as Occasion requires.

And such Widows of Officers as are entituled to the faid Penfon, and who refide within the Bills of Mortality, are hereby required to appear in Perfon at the faid Office, in order so be examined as to their refetive Presenfons, for which Purpofe Attendance will be given from the Hour of Eleven o Clock in the Forenoon till Two, on Wednefday and Friday in every Week during the Month of March next, and fuch Widows refiding within the Bills of Mortality as aforefaid, as are defirous to make Affignments of their Penfons, or grant Letters of Attorney, for the future, are required to execute the fame to the Prefence of Two of the Clerks in the faid Office, to be by them atteffed. Thofe Officers Widows that refide at a Diffance, are likewife required forthwith to authorize fome Perfon of Credis to appear for them
