Petersbourg, February 10.

A Courier arrived here last Thursday from Kioff, with Advice, that as there was now no Appearance that the Tartars would make them a Visit this Season, Felt Marshal Munich set out from thence the 29th past, so that he is expected here this Evening or To-morrow. Count Ostein, the Emperor's Minister, having had his Audience of Leave of the Czarina, is to set out this Day or To-morrow for Vienna: Her Majesty has made him a Present of her Picture set with Diamonds, valued at 6 or 8000 Roubles, and of 6000 Roubles in Money.

Warsaw, Feb. 25, N. S. Sunday last Sig. Sarbonelli, the Pope's Nuncio, made his publick Entry, in Honour of which all the Nobility sent their Coaches; the Foreign Ministers were invited by the Great Marshal of Poland to attend this Ceremony, but those of the Protestant Powers excused themselves. The Nuncio was conducted to his Audiences of the King and Queen, and of the Princesses Royal, by the Bishop of Cambric.

Warsaw, Feb. 28, N. S. By the last Letters from Petersbourg we hear, that M. Keyserling set out the 9th Instant, as he intended; but has Leave to stay seven or eight Days in Courland before he proceeds hither. It is reported here, that a Minister from Constantinople arrived at Jassi, the Capital of Moldavia, the 14th Instant, in his Way to Warsaw. The Marquis Malaspina has received a Courier from Naples, with an Account, that the Queen of the two Sicilies was fallen ill of the Small Pox, but that she was judged to be out of Danger.

Bank, 14 December, 1738.

Upon a Representation from His Majesty's Postmaster-General, That it is apprehended that the Expectation of finding Bank Bills in the Letters, gives Encouragement to the frequent Robbery of the Mails; The Bank of England, to contribute what in their lies to put a Stop thereto, and to render their Bills of no Significancy or Value to those who are guilty of such flagitious Practices, do declare, That for the Benefit and Security of those who have Occasion to transact Money Affairs in the Country, they will from and after the First Day of January next (instead of Three

Days Sight Bills) give to such as desire the same, their Bills payable at Seven Days after Sight to _____ or Order, whereby in Case of a Robbery, the Proprietors will have Time to give Notice thereof; and if the Indorsements are duly filled up, as they expect they should, they can be of no Use or Service but to the right Owners.

And whereas they may fall into those Hands who may be ignorant of the Form of indorsing them, a Blank Indorsement will be printed on the Back for the Parties to fill up, and to be repeated as often as Occasion requires.

An Abstract of the Verdict of Joseph Robinson, of Sibley, in the said County, Gentleman, and the rest of his Fellows, taken at a General Court of Sewers, holden by Adjournment at the Guildhall in Boston, in the said County, on Wednesday the 29th Day of November, in the Twelfth Year of the Reign of our Sovereign Lord George the Second, by the Grace of God, of Great Britain, France, and Ireland, King, Defender of the Faith, &c. and in the Year of our Lord, 1738; by and before John Blaydwin, Mayor of Boston, the Reverend Joseph Greenhill, John Smith, and John Francis, Clerks, John Parish, Robert Thompson, and others, Gentlemen, his said Majesty's Commissioners of Sewers for the said County, amongst others assigned, whereof Three of them are of the Quorum.

WE present and find, That not only the common Fens lying South of Kime Ea, and the River Wytham, to Glen River, and Bourn Ea, but also many of the inclosed Lands and Pastures thereunto adjacent, and which do, or ought to drain by and through a certain Goat, called Redfons Goat, in

Skirbeck Quarter, in the Parish of Skirbeck, in the County of Lincoln aforesaid, are very much annoyed and overflowed with Water, for Want of sufficient and proper Drains, Goats, and Sluices, to issue and carry off the Land Floods and Waters, which fall in and overflow the said common Fens and adjacent Lands, the aforesaid Sluice or Goat, called *Redstone Goat*, and the Drains and Works of Sewers leading thereto, being not of sufficient Capacity or Largeness (when the same are in the best Order and Condition, and rendered as effectual and useful as they can possibly be) to issue and carry off the Waters, which in all wet Seasons do fall into and overflow the said common Fens and Lands, and must there stagnate and lie, unless some new Goat, Sluice, Drains, and Works of Sewers be made, for the more effectual issuing and carrying off the said Waters. We therefore present, that a new Goat or Sluice be made and placed in or near the Haven Bank, at the End of the South Forty Foot Drain, at or nigh whereunto an old Goat, called *Black Goat* or Sluice formerly stood, in *Skirbeck Quarter* aforesaid; and that the said Goat ought to be made of Brick, Stone, Timber, and other Materials, with two Tuns ten Feet wide a-piece within the said Tuns, and forty Feet in Length within the same, with four Sea Doors, and two Land Doors; and that the Sea Apron of the said Goat be thirty Feet, and the Land Apron fifteen Feet in Length, with proportionable Wings made to the same: And that the said Goat be made and laid down at the Cost and Charges of the Commoners and Owners of Lands which drain and issue their Waters by the said Goat, according to the Benefit they may or will receive, or the Danger they may or will avoid thereby; which to do will cost 1500 *l*.

Also, We present the several Drains and Sewers leading to the said new intended Goat, to be ditch'd, scour'd, and cleans'd; and the Bridges over the same to be sufficiently repair'd, and the Banks thereto be-lon-ging; as also the Banks of *Kims Ho*; and the River *Wyibam* to be heighten'd and thicken'd, which to do, as particularly mentioned and charged in the said Verdict, will cost 5312 *l*. 5 *s*. 9 *d*.

ORDERED by the Court, That the Clerk of Sewers do give Notice in the *London Gazette*, *Stam-ford & Mercury*, and *Boston Weekly Journal*, of the said Verdict; and also send Abstracts to the respective Dikereeves or Officers of the Presentments made in each Parish by the said Verdict, with Notice that the same will be passed into a Law, unless Cause be shewn to the contrary, at a Court of Sewers appointed to be held at the Guildhall in *Boston* aforesaid, on *Thursday* the 26th Day of *April* next.
