The King's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

His Majesty in Council was this Day pleased to appoint John Blacket of Wylam, Esq; to be Sheriff of the County of Northumberland, in the Room of William Errington of Walwick Grainge, Esq; deceased.

Whitehall, March 24.

On Wednesday last the Right Honourable the Lord Mayor, the Aldermen, and Common Council of the City of London, being assembled in a full Court at Guildhall, resolved to address his Majesty upon the Birth of the young Prince; and a Committee chosen to draw it up going out, soon returned with an Address, which was unanimously approved; and the two Sheriffs were ordered immediately to wait on His Majesty, to know his Pleasure when he would be attended with it by the whole Body. Accordingly the Sheriffs waited on his Majesty the same Day, who was pleased to appoint Thursday. And then the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and Common Council, waited on his Majesty at St. James's; when Thomas Garrard Esq; Common Serjeant at Law of the City of London (in the Absence of the Recorder) presented the following humble Address to his Majesty: They were introduced by his Grace the Duke of Grafton, Chamberlain of his Majesty's Household.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Lord Mayor, Aldermen and Commons of the City of London, in Common-Council assembled.

May it please your Majesty,

WE your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Lord Mayor, Aldermen and Commons, in Common-Council assembled, beg Leave to congratulate your Ma-

jesty on the happy Delivery of her Royal Highness the Princess of Wales, and the Birth of another Prince.

The Glory of your Majesty's Reign consists in the Happiness and Liberty of your Subjects, which alone can render this Nation great and powerful; and that inestimable Blessing entirely depending on your Majesty; and on the firm Establishment of the Protestant Succession in your Royal House, every Addition to the Number of your illustrious Race must constantly furnish Occasion of Joy to your People, and of their sincere Congratulation to your Majesty.

To which His Majesty was pleased to make the following most gracious Answer.

I thank you for this Mark of your Duty to Me; and for the Satisfaction you express at the Increase of my Family.

They all had the Honour to kiss his Majesty's Hand.

Naples Feb. 24. N. S. A few Days ago, M. Simonetti, the Pope's Nuncio, had an Audience of the King at Portici, in which 'tis said he acquainted his Majesty, that the Pope had issued a Bull for preserving the Ecclesiastical Immunities in this Kingdom. M. Spinola, Envoy from Genoa, has had an Audience of Leave of the King, on his Departure for that Republick. The King has presented him with his Picture set with Jewels. On the 18th the Regiment of Annonia embarked on board nine Transports for Gaeta, to relieve a Swiss Regiment which arrived here on the 21st. The Queen is entirely recovered of the small Pox, and has begun to walk about in her Apartment.

Leghorn, March 6. On the 2d Instant in the Evening the Great Duke and Duchess, and Prince Charles of Lorraine, arrived at Pisa from Florence, on which Occasion five Illuminations on both Sides of the River were made for three Evenings successively. Their Royal Highnesses went immediately to the Cathedral Church, where the Archbishop, Clergy, and the City Magistrates in a Body, attended,

attended, and Te Deum was sung. On the 3d they were complimented by the Princess Dowager Eleonora, who for that Purpose went from Pontadera to Pisa. The Nobility were to pay their Court to their Royal Highnesses, and the Great Duke reviewed the Imperial Troops quartered at Pisa, as they marched before his Palace. On the 5th was represented the Battle on the Bridge, and on the 6th in the Morning their Royal Highnesses departed from that City; whence they arrived here at Noon in a Gondola: They were received without the Gates by M. de Wachtendonck and M. Braittewitz, at the Head of the Imperial Troops in Garrison here, drawn up in two Divisions along the Road, which Troops the Great Duke stopt to view: His Royal Highness was saluted at his Entrance into the Town by a triple Discharge of the Artillery, when M. Capponi, the Tuscan Governor, presented to the Great Duke the Keys of the City: Thence their Royal Highnesses proceeded to the Cathedral Church, where Te Deum was sung, and the City Magistrates in a Body attended at the Entry of the Palace to compliment their Royal Highnesses: In the Afternoon they went to see the Gallies, and thence to the Great Mole, where they were saluted by all the Ships and Vessels in Port; and in the Evening were to see the Illuminations throughout the City, particularly in the Streets of the Jews.

Florence, March 9. On the 3d the Marques Ricardi, Count Altham, and Count Rinigle set out hence for Rome, Naples, and Turin, to notify the Arrival of the Great Duke in Tuscany, and to compliment these Potentates on the Part of his Highness. On the 4th the Pope's Nuncio, who ever since the Death of the late Great Duke had remained here in private, retired to his Country-house, and has ordered his Baggage to be packed up: He designs 'tis thought to repair very soon to his Nunciature at Venice, without making any Compliment to this Court, since the Pope has not accepted of the Plan of the Ceremonial proposed by the Great Duke to the Nuncios here, and ordered M. Gualtjeri, who was appointed to succeed in this Nunciature, to repair to the vacant Inquisitorship at Malta. Thirty Loads of Wines and Provisions, have been sent from hence to Germany for the Service of Prince Charles of Lorraine for the ensuing Campaign in Hungary: Other Provisions are preparing for that Purpose for the Great Duke, which his Royal Highness has ordered to be got ready against his Return from Leghorn: His Royal Highness

and his Dutches, 'tis thought, will depart hence on their Return to Vienna by the 20th of April.

Bank, 14 December, 1738.

Upon a Representation from His Majesty's Postmaster-General, That it is apprehended that the Expectation of finding Bank Bills in the Letters, gives Encouragement to the frequent Robbery of the Mails; The Bank of England, to contribute what in them lies to put a Stop thereto, and to render their Bills of no Significancy or Value to those who are guilty of such flagitious Practices, do declare, That for the Benefit and Security of those who have Occasion to transact Money Affairs in the Country, they will from and after the First Day of January next (instead of Three Days Sight Bills) give to such as desire the same, their Bills payable at Seven Days after Sight to _____ or Order, whereby in Case of a Robbery, the Proprietors will have Time to give Notice thereof; and if the Indorsements are duly filled up, as they expect they should, they can be of no Use or Service but to the right Owners.

And whereas they may fall into those Hands who may be ignorant of the Form of indorsing them, a Blank Indorsement will be printed on the Back for the Parties to fill up, and to be repeated as often as Occasion requires.
