Warsaw, March 28; N. S.

SEVERAL Letters from Podolia and Volhinia mention the late Defeat of the Tartars, and the Havock they have made in their Retreat thro' Poland. The Palatine of Russia is informed, that they have destroyed two Towns, 16 Villages, and carried off 8000 Inhabitants; but the Great General imputes their Incurſion to nothing but Ignorance of the Country, alſuring that the little Damage they have committed was before they knew that they were on the Territories of an Ally; and that they have ſince given the faireſt Promiſes to releaſe the Captives, and to repair all Devaſtations. Some of theſe Letters mention the Plague's being broke out again in two Villages near Kamienek. Their Polish Majesties intend to ſet out for Saxony about the 6th of next Month.

Vienna, April 4, N. S. The Grand Maſter of Malta has offered to furniſh the Complements of Men for two Imperial Ships upon the Danube, by ſending 150 Men and ſeven Knights for each Ship. Marſhal Wallis ſet out on the 2d Inſtant in the Morning for the Army.

Copenhagen, April 4, N. S. Preparations are making at Hirſholm for the Reception of the Royal Family, who are to remove thither as ſoon as the warm Seaſon comes on. The Margrave, Stadholder of Slefwick, is expected at Court this Spring.

Copenhagen, April 7, N. S. The King of Denmark having been let Blood Yeſterday, there was no Council nor Court at Fredericksberg; but thoſe Colleges who received his Maſteſty's Orders, in the Afternoon waited upon him, and were diſpatched as uſual.

Bank, 14 December, 1738.

Upon a Representation from His Maſteſty's Poſt-maſter-General, That it is apprehended that the Expectation of finding Bank Bills in the Letters, gives Encouragement to the frequent Robbery of the Mails; The Bank of England, to contribute what in them lies to put a Stop thereto, and to render their Bills of

no ſignificantly or Value to thoſe who are guilty of ſuch ſidgiouſ Practices, do declare, That for the Benefit and Security of thoſe who have Occaſion to tranſact Money Affairs in the Country, they will from and after the Firſt Day of January next (inſtead of Three Days Sight Bills) give ſo ſuch as deſire the ſame, their Bills payable at Seven Days after Sight to what Order wherewithal Caſt of a Robbery, the Proprietors will have Time to give Notice thereof; and if the Indorſements are duly filled up, as they expect they ſhould, they can be of no Uſe on Service but to the right Owners.

And whereas they may fall into thoſe Hands who may be ignorant of the Form of indorſing them, a Blank Indorſement will be printed on the Back for the Parties to fill up, and to be repeated as often as Occaſion requires.
