On the 6th the King and Queen began their Journey early in the Morning, lay that Night at Rawa, the next at Widava, the next at Warrenberg, and at Two this Afternoon their Majesties arrived here, followed soon after by the Cabinet Minister the Count de Bruhl. Their Royal Highnesses the Princes Xavier and Charles went out a League from hence to meet their Majesties; the two young Princesses Royal were placed to receive them a little without the City Gate, accompanied by Prince Albert their youngest Brother. A great Number of Persons of Distinction went out of the City, to meet and congratulate their Majesties on their happy Arrival: And at Night there was a great Drawing Room at Court. The Princesses Marianne and Josephé were left at Warsaw, whence they will set out next Week to come by short Journies hither.
