HIS Majesty came this Day to the House of Peers, and being in His Royal Robes, seated on the Throne with the usual Solemnity, Sir Charles Dalton, Gentleman-Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a Message from His Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the House of Peers; the Commons being come thither accordingly, His Majesty was pleased to give the Royal Assent to,

An Act for granting an Aid to his Majesty by a Land Tax, to be raised in Great Britain for the Service of the Year One Thousand Seven Hundred and Thirty Nine.

An Act to continue the Duties for Encouragement of the Coinage of Money.

An Act to indemnify Persons who have omitted to qualify themselves for Offices and Employments within the Time limited by Law; and for allowing further Time for that Purpose.

An Act to enable the Inhabitants of the Parish of St. Nicholds in the City of Worcester, to raise Money for discharging the Debts they have contracted in rebuilding their Parish Church.

An Act to enable the Parishioners of the Parish of Ealing in the County of Middlesex to raise Money by Rates upon themselves for finishing the Church of the said Parish.

An Act for applying a Sum of Money given by the Will of Daniel Wiseman Esquire deceased, for finishing the new Church at Woolwich in the County of Kent, and for raising an Annuity by an Assessment on the Parish of Woolwich, during the Lives of Mary Wiseman and Elizabeth Crouch, and the Life of the Survivor of them, pursuant to the said Will.

An Act for enlarging the Term and Powers granted by an Act passed in the sixth Year of the Reign of his present Majesty, for repairing the Road from Fyfield in the County of Berks to St. John's Bridge in the County

of Gloucester; and for repairing the Road from an Inn called the Hind's Head in the Parish of Kingston Bagpuze in the said County of Berks, to that Part of New-bridge which lies in the said County of Berks.

An Act for repairing the Road between Stamford and Grantham in the County of Lincoln.

An Act for repairing the Roads from the North West Parts of the County of Lincoln, through Nettlam Fields, Wragby Lane, and Baumber Fields, to the Woods or North East Part of the said County.

Bank, 14 December, 1738.

Upon a Representation from His Majesty's Postmaster-General, That it is apprehended that the Expectation of finding Bank Bills in the Letters, gives Encouragement to the frequent Robbery of the Mails; The Bank of England, to contribute what in them

lies to put a Stop thereto, and to render their Bills of no Significancy or Value to those who are guilty of such flagitious Practices, do declare; That for the Benefit and Security of those who have Occasion to transact Money Affairs in the Country, they will from and after the first Day of January next (instead of Three Days Sight Bills) give to such as desire the same, their Bills payable at Seven Days after Sight to ——— or Order, whereby in Case of a Robbery, the Proprietors will have Time to give Notice thereof; and if the Indorsements are duly filled up, as they expect they should, they can be of no Use or Service but to the Sight Owners.

And whereas they may fall into those Hands who may be ignorant of the Form of indorsing them, a Blank Indorsement will be printed on the Back for the Parties to fill up, and to be repeated as often as Occasion requires.
