Constantinople, March 12.

ON the 10th the Grand Vizier was sent for to the Seraglio, where he was deprived of the Seals, and confined till this Morning, when he was put on board a Galley which is departed with him for Rhodes, where he is to remain a Prisoner in the Castle. He has been according to Custom stripped of every thing, and before his Departure received a scanty Provision of Cloaths and ready Money; there is an usual small Allowance for Persons of his Rank in these unhappy Circumstances. The Seal was sent the Evening of the late Vizier's Deposition by the Sultan's Saliotar to Euliah Mehmet Pasha, who has for some time been Governour of Widdin, and commanded the last Campaign at the Siege of Orsova, and in one or two of the Actions in the Field. The Caimacan of this City is to be continued in the same Employment this Year, he having found Means to disperse the Rebels in Asia, and is expected here in three or four Days.

Bologna, May 9. The Great Dutchess of Tuscany, on her Passage through this City, agreeably to the Instructions from the Pope, was treated and complimented as Arch-dutchess of Austria. The Vice-Legate received her Royal Highness at the Confines of Tuscany, and attended her to those of the Duke of Modena. At her Entrance into this City she was saluted by the Guns of the Castle, and attended by a Detachment of the Pope's Light Horse-Guards; and in the Evening her Highness was entertain'd with a Ball at the Palace of Count Aldovrandi, where she lodg'd. The Great Duke and Prince Charles were complimented without the Gates of the City by the Vice-Legate, and saluted by the Guns of the Castle. On the 30th past their Royal Highnesses were most magnificently entertain'd by the Duke of Modena at Reggio, and on the 1st Instant arrived at Parma, where they were complimented by the Dutchess Dowager Dorotea, and M. Fracen the Governour of Milan. They were saluted by the Guns of the Castle; and after they had changed Horses, proceeded to Firenzola, where they lodg'd that Night in the Palace of Count Bertagnini. The Great Duke and Prince Charles went to see the Camp near Parma, where the famous Battle was fought on the 24th of June 1734, between the Imperialists and the Allies. On the 2d their Royal Highnesses separated, the Great Duke and Prince Charles proceeded for Alessandria della Paglia and Turin, and the Great Dutchess for Milan, where they were to meet again; and to depart thence on the 8th for Swisserland, there to meet the Dutchess Dowager of Lorraine.

Berlin, May 23, N. S. On Tuesday Evening the King of Prussia removed from Potsdam to this Town. On the Thursday Morning following the Prince Royal, at the Head of his Regiment, arrived also here from Rupin; as did from their respective Quarters the four other Regiments which come hither every Year in this Season: And this Day being fixed for the general Review, all the Foot now here, consisting of 20 Battallions, which make 15,000 Men, was drawn up in one Line, at the usual Place, about three English Miles from hence: But as they did not perform to his Prussian Majesty's Satisfaction, they were order'd, after having fired but twice by Platoons, to march back into the Town; and next Monday they are to pass a second Time in Review before his Prussian Majesty.

Hambourg, May 26. Advice is just come, that the Duke of Holstein is dangerously ill, and even thought to be past all Hopes of Recovery.
