Petersbourg, June 2.

THIS Day being the Anniversary of the Duke of Courland's Election, all the Foreign Ministers, Russian Nobility and Gentry, waited on his Highness in the Morning, to make their Compliments on the Occasion.

Vienna, June 24, N. S. The Elector of Bavaria arrived at Melck with the Electress and their Children on Saturday last. The Empress Dowager Amelia set out from hence on Sunday. The Elector knowing what Time she would arrive at St. Polten on Monday, surprized her there, and presenting himself hastily to hand her Majesty out of her Coach, was pushed back by the Prince of Leichtenstein, her Grand Maitre, who did not know him, and told him, *Sir, that belongs to me.* She gave half of her Jewels to her Saxon Grand-children when she saw them last Year in Bohemia; the other half is now for her Bavarian Grand-children. There is to be a French Comedy at this Interview in the Convent of Melck, where the two Courts are lodged. Letters from Semlin of the 16th advise, that General Neuperg was then there with a very considerable Body of Imperialists, expecting his last Orders from Marshal Wallis.

Copenhagen, June 27, N. S. The French Squadron consisting of the following Ships; the Bourbon, Marquess d'Antin, 74 Guns, 760 Men; the Fleuron, M. Bamilk, 64 Guns, 660 Men; the Elizabeth, M. Nesmond, 64 Guns, 660 Men; the Ardent, M. d'Epinay, 60 Guns, 660 Men; the Meduse, M. Dache, 18 Guns, 180 Men, has at length passed the Sound, and the Marquess d'Antin who commands it is now at this Place. The Court being absent, he talks of pursuing his Voyage to the Baltick in a few Days.

Berlin, June 27, N. S. We hear that Colonel Sinclair returning from Constantinople to Stockholm was assassinated on the Frontiers of Lusatia.

Hague, June 30, N. S. His Excellency Horatio Walpole, Esq; his Britannick Majesty's Ambassadour Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary to the States General, arrived here Yesterday from England.

Whitehall, June 25.

On Saturday last his Majesty reviewed the four Troops of Horse Guards and the two Troops of Horse Grenadier Guards, in Hyde Park.

Whitehall, June 26.

His Majesty has been pleased to constitute and appoint Robert Byng Esq; to be Captain General and Governour in Chief in and over his Majesty's Islands of Barbadoes, St. Lucia, Dominico, St. Vincent's, Tobago, and the rest of his Majesty's Islands, Colonies and Plantations in America commonly called or known by the Name of the Charibbee Islands lying and being to the Windward of Guadaloupe.
