Berlin, June 26, N. S.

THE King of Prussia came to this City this Afternoon, and To-morrow proposes to set out for Prussia. None of the Foreign Ministers accompany his Prussian Majesty in this Journey, which will last about Six Weeks.

Copenhagen, June 30, N. S. The French Squadron, without any Reinforcement, (the Expectation whereof seems to have been entirely groundless) is just now under Sail bound for Stockholm, where the Marquis d'Antin, according to his Discourses, intends to stay about a Fortnight, and then to make the Tour of the Baltick; after which he proposes, towards the End of August, or in the Month of September at farthest, to return hither again, and to pay his Court to their Danish Majesties, who came last Night to Fredericksbourg from reviewing the Militia, and this Day after Dinner are to return to Hirschholm.

Dresden, July 1, N. S. By a Messenger who arrived here the 28th past from the Russian Army marching in four Columns under the Command of Feldt Marshal Munich, we have Advice, that that General came upon the Frontiers of Poland the 8th Instant, and passed by Trilissa the 12th, and that the general Rendezvous of the Army is to be at Wolodarka; which Route seems to tend to Choczim. The said General in a Letter to his Polish Majesty, promises to observe the strictest Order.

Whereas it has been represented to His Majesty, that as the ten following Regiments are coming from Ireland to Great Britain, viz. the Regiments of Foot commanded by Colonel Guise, Colonel Howard, Colonel Campbell, Colonel Wentworth, Colonel Blakeney, Colonel Handasyd, Colonel Defcary, Rt. Lord James Cavendish, Colonel Bland, and Colonel Onslow, many private Soldiers may have formerly deserted from them, and since enlisted themselves in other Regiments in Great Britain; and that divers Soldiers, who did formerly belong to the Regiments now in Great Britain, may have deserted from them, and entered themselves in some of the ten Regiments of Foot above-mentioned: His Majesty is therefore graciously pleased hereby to grant his Pardon to all such Soldiers, who may have deserted in the Manner as aforesaid, before the first Day of this Instant June inclusive, and who are now in any of the said ten Regiments, or in any of those in Great Britain; and likewise to declare, that it is his Royal Intention they shall continue in his Service, as they now are, without being molested or claimed by the Officers of the respective Corps to whom they did formerly belong.
