*Dintzick, May 6. The Polish Letters from War fair. dated 28 pail, tell us, that Monsieur Brequ Surrofta of Novalworsky, is defigned Extraordinary Ambassador to the Crown of Sweden; his main business is to defire their assistance against the Torks. The Act passed for Pole-Money is to gener l, that none either Spiritual or Temporal are exempted, except onely the King and Queen. The Primes Regni or Archbithop of Gnesna, mu pa/1800 Gilders; the Bishops of Crackow, Platzko, and Ern lanu, each 1500; those of Lemberg and Gulm, each 600; and those Bithops in Reusland, each 300 Gilders. A suffragan must pay 60, a Canon 30, and others accordingly. The Temporal Lords are thus Taxed, viz. A Veywoda 300 Gilders; a Castellan Major 150; a Cattellan Minor 75; and an ordinary Geneleman 3 Gilders. The Soldiers are to payas followeth, The Felat-Herr 300 Gilders, the unite Feldt-Herr 200. a Colonel 100, a Lieumenant Color, 160, a Major 50, a Captain of Horse 30, a Trooper 3, and a Foot Soldier 2 Gilders. The Money Collected by this Tax, thall be imployed for the tailing Forces to oppose the rurk, who they hope will northis year invade them, though it y are advised of the contrary from Walachia and Moldavia, and that the Enemy waits onely till there is Grass in the Field for their Cattle, and then will attack them. They have fent extraordinary great Provisions into Caminice, and fresh Recruits of Men, there being very many of their Garrison Soldiers dead this Winter, and more run away.

Fram fort. May 14. The Circle of Franconia having absolutel, refused to suffer the Lorrain Troops to come and quarter in their Territories, they have been forced to follow the Imperialists towards Bohemir. The Marquels de Grana passed some days since through this place, on his return to Vienna, having, as we are told, left the command of the Imperial Regiment at Cotogne, to the Baron de Leyen. The Town of Strasburgh have caused their Bridge, car the indexe of the moit Chri tian King, to be pulled down again. We reckon here, that fince March above 150 Boats have pulled down the Mojelle towards the Rhine with French Soldiers, and that they must have had on board them, near 20000 Men, belides the Cavalry which passed by I and. The Elector of Bavaria has a considerable Body of Men on foot in the Upper Palatinate, near New-

Liege, Miy 19. On Tuesday tot Count Tot, Ambididor Extraordinity from the Crown of Sweden, pulied through this place, on his way to Aix la Chapelle. The French continue to buy up all the Provisions they ean in this Country, and have their Migazines at Masonot sal Congress; they have at present at those two places, about 4000 Man, Hurft an l'Euot, who are comminished in chaif by the Sieur, Mantel, Governor of

Charleroy. They endeavor to streighten Maestrichs what they can, by hindring all Commerce between that Garrison, and the Countrey People.

Cologne, May 19. Notwithstanding our Letters from all hands, confirm the conclusion of the Treaty of Accommodation between the French and the Elector of Brandenburgh, and give us the particulars, yet those of the Dutch Interest in these parts, will not yet allow of it; but on the contrary, with much confidence, report, That the faid Elector is Recruiting his old Regiments, and raising several new Forces to come down with the Imperialists to their assistance. From Munster they write, that the Bishop was bringing together a Body of 6000 Men at Nieuhuys, in the County of Benthem, within four Leagues from Coverden, to which was to be added Colonel Wedels Regiment, confifting of 1100 Men; and these together joyned with the Forces commanded by the Prince of Conde, in order to the Attacking of Converden. It is reported here, That the Bishop of Munster is to put Ommeskans into the hands of the Prince of Conde, and the Town of Steenwyck, into those of the Elector of Calogne. The Bishop of Strasburgh is at present here, but intends togo to Grimmelinghausen, to confer with the Duke of News burgh. All Acts of Hostilitie are ceased between the French and the Elector of Brandenburgh, and Monsieur de Turenne has discharged all the Prisoners, which were taken in that Electors Service without Ranfom.

Aix la Chapelle, May 19. The Swedish Mediators, as likewife the Plenipotentiaries of the States General, are arrived here, though fome will still have, that Co-

logne will be the place of Treaty.

Arras, May 17. The fifteenth instant his Grace the Duke of Monmouth, arrived at Dourlens, (the most Frontier Town of Picardy) where his Grace was recrived by the Governor, and the rest of the Officers, with the greatest respect and kindness imaginable, the Keys of the Town being the greatest Compliment they could make him, having been put into his Graces hands at night. Yesterday his Grace arrived here, and was received in like manner by the Governor of this place, lodged at his House, and entertained very nobly.

Liste, May 19. On Wednesday last his Grace the Duke of Monmouth arrived here, in one day from Arras; the next morning his Grace went on Horfback, being accompanied by several persons on Horsback-to view the Cittadel and the Fortifications of this place. This morning his Grace's Equippage is gone for Courtray, whither he himself will follow this afternoon. We hear that the whole Army at Courtray, hath Orders to march on Munday or Tuelday next, but whi-

ther, is not yet known.

Courtray, May 20. The seventeenth instant his Grace the Duke of Monmouth arrived here, and went that Evening to wait upon the King, by whom he was received with demonstrations of a particular kindness and esteem. On Munday next his Grace is to draw out, and command the whole Army, as Lieutenant General, in order to their marching the next day.
