Petersbourg, June 16.

LAST Wednesday being the Duke of Courland's Name-day, all the Foreign Ministers and Russian Nobility waited on his Highness in the Morning, to make their Compliments on the Occasion.

Dresden, July 8. Letters which arrived here Yesterday brought Advice, that on the 21st past the Russian Army commanded by Count Munich arrived at Constantinow, which seems the direct Road to Choczim. They are said to observe as strict Orders as possible in passing through the Polish Territories. M. Poniatowski, Palatin of Mazovia, set out Yesterday for the Hague, from whence he goes to Aix la Chapelle, and will return hither towards the latter End of the Autumn.

Elsenore, July 14, N. S. Letters from Carelsrona of the 12th Instant advise, that Admiral Siosterna was lying ready to convoy the Transports for Finland, with Seven Sail of Men of War; and that 16 Sail more were fitting out with all possible Expedition; but whither designed was not then known.

Berlin, July 11, N. S. On Wednesday Morning last, the King of Prussia set out on his Journey to Prussia, and he is not expected back before the 18th or 20th of next Month. The Margrave of Bareuth leaves this Place also this Evening, on his Return home.

It is the Directions of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, that all such Men who have voluntarily enter'd themselves, in or about the City of London, or that shall hereafter so enter, do forthwith repair on board the respective Ships they enter to serve in, excepting the Press Gangs who may be employed with the Lieutenants in raising Men for the Fleet, otherwise they will forfeit the Benefit promis'd them by his Majesty's late Royal Proclamation; and Notice is hereby given, that they must apply to the Principal Officers and Commissioners of the Navy for Conduct-Money, if the Ships they have entered to serve in be at Chatham, at the Buoy of the Nere, or in the Downes; or if at Portsmouth or Spithead, for Conduct-Money, and Carriage for their Chests and Bedding, not exceeding One Hundred Weight. And if there are any Men in or about the Town who have enter'd for the Ships at Plymouth, they are also to apply to the Navy Board for Conduct-Money, and Carriage for their Chests and Bedding to Portsmouth, from whence they will be put on Board their proper Ships, if come to Spithead, or be sent to Plymouth by the first Opportunity; in order whereunto they must apply themselves to Philip Cavendish, Esq; Admiral of the Blue Squadron of his Majesty's Fleet.
