Letters which arrived here Yesterday brought Advice, that on the 21st past the Russian Army commanded by Count Munich arrived at Constantinow, which seems the direct Road to Choczim. They are said to observe as strict Orders as possible in passing through the Polish Terri-M. Poniatowski, Palatin of Mazovia, set out Yesterday for the Hague, from whence he goes to Aix la Chapelle, and will return hither towards the latter End of the Autumn. Elsenore, July 14, N. S.
