From the Imperial Camp at Meroua July 18, N.S.

ON the 5th and 6th, the rest of the auxiliary Troops of Bavaria and Cologne arrived in the Camp. On the 7th a Colonel, a Major, four Captains, four Lieutenants, four Ensigns, with 1000 Foot, were ordered to repair the Danube, and encamp at the Village of Potza, which is at a little Distance from our Bridge; and 50 Hussars have been sent to them to patrol in that Neighbourhood. We have Advice of the 26th past from the Body of our Forces in Transylvania, that on the 12th a Party of 5000 of the Enemy appeared near Caransebes, most of them Rebels or Robbers with very few Turks among them: That half of their Number ravaged the Country as far as Lugos and Sakos, and massacred some Persons at the last Place. But the Troops under Prince Lobkowitz having put themselves in Motion, the Enemy retired on the 12th, 13th and 14th as far as Temalna and behind Mehadia. The Forces in Transylvania are separated into three Camps, for their more commodious Subsistence. On the 7th at Night arrived here a Turkish Aga, with a Guard of 50 Men, bringing Letters from the grand Army of the Turks to Field-Marshal Wallis. The Aga with his Guard were encamped before the front of our Left Wing, and were furnished by us with all Necessaries. To Day the said Aga with his Guard were dispatched with the Field-Marshal's Answer.

Srockholm, July 3. The French Squadron came up the 30th past, about Four in the Afternoon. M. d'Antin saluted with fifteen

Guns the Castle here, which was return'd with sixteen. As soon as the Squadron came to an Anchor, M. St. Severin, the French Ambassador, went on board to pay a Visit to M. d'Antin, and to invite him and a Number of his Officers to Supper; The Ambassador was received on board with a Discharge of 15 Guns. This Morning M. St. Severin carried M. d'Antin to Carlberg, to present him and his Officers to their Swedish Majesties. Most of the Officers are gone by Water in eight of their Boats. They are to be admitted to Audience out of Mourning, tho' the Court is in it since Sunday for the Death of the Duke of Holstein.

Dresden, July 19, N.S. According to the last Advices from Poland, the Russian Army was on its March towards the Dniester, and 'twas reckon'd would reach Medzyboz by the 27th past. They have a numerous Artillery, and a considerable Body of them keep on the Left, to be ready to oppose any Incurſion of the Budziack Tartars. There has been a Meeting at Kaminiac of some Separators, great Officers, and Nobility of the Palatinate of Podolia, to take proper Measures for the Preservation of its Tranquillity: The Result of it has been, that they would send Deputies of their Nobility to Count Munich, and to the Commanders of the Turkish Troops, to solicit each Side in Behalf of their Palatinate. They agreed at the same time on Means for gathering Stores of Provisions, and Necessaries for repairing the Fortifications of Kaminiac. The said Advices add, that the Turks having been reinforced by Troops from Asia, have formed a considerable Detachment, which is marching towards Chockzin.
