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Stockholm, July 17.

THE King of Sweden was on board the Bourbon on Saturday in the Afternoon, accompanied by the Counts de la Gardie and Gillenbourg, Mess. Aſlebourg, Wibel, and others; a Company of the Guards was drawn up on the Ship's Bridge, and as soon as his Majesty's Barge put off, on a Signal from the French Admiral, there immediately follow'd a Volley of the Small Arms from all the Ships, and then a general Discharge of all the Cannon except of the Bourbon, not to incommodate his Swedish Majesty, who was received by M. d'Antin at his Barge. A Collation was prepared, but the King of Sweden only took a Glass of Burgundy to drink the Admiral's Health, and after having been through the Ship and stayed about an Hour, return'd, when he was again saluted by a general Discharge of the Cannon of all the Ships, the Bourbon included. The Marquess d'Antin, with his Officers, and the French Ambassadour, were treated last Night at Ulrichs-Dahl by the King of Sweden's Order, the Count and Countess de la Gardie doing the Honours; several Senators were there also.

Journal from the Imperial Army commanded by Felt-Marshal Count Wallis.

On the 17th of July the Army marched to a new Camp, which the Quarter-masters had mark'd out the Day before, at Wisniza, all but nine Battallions; viz. two of Old Daun, two of Seckendorf, two of Young Daun, two of Cologne, and one of Bavaria, which remained in the Camp of Merova. The same Day General Neiperger with the Body of Forces he commands, was to encamp at Jaboka, and the said nine Battallions left in the Camp were ordered to join him.

On the 18th we received Advice, that the whole Turkish Army was arrived at Rawna, and designed to pass the Morave, upon which Marshal Wallis came immediately to a Resolution to order the Body under the Command of General Neiperger, to join the main Army. The 21st we learnt that the Furks had a considerable Body encamped at Semendria, and a strong Detachment at Krozka, which they were continually reinforcing: Whereupon it was resolved in a Council of War, at which the Generals Neiperger and Sehr, the Prince of Hildsburg-hausen and General Styrum assisted, not to wait for the Body commanded by Count Neiperger, but to attack the Enemy before they had fortified themselves at Krozka, which is a very advantageous Post. Pursuant thereto, Marshal Wallis marched the same Evening, without Beat of Drum, or Sound of Trumpet, with 14 Regiments of Horse, and 18 Companies of Grenadiers, being himself at their Head, accompanied by General Sehr; leaving Orders for Prince Hildsburg-hausen to follow him with all the Infantry; General Neiperger promising to hasten his Troops to Wisniza. The 22d at Day-Break Marshal Wallis arrived at Kroska with his Detachment, and immediately pushed the Enemy on all Sides, notwithstanding the Approaches to Kroska were very difficult, because there was no coming at the Enemy but through Defiles. The Regiment of Hohenzollern, which had behaved extremely well, having advanced too far, was attacked afresh and forced to abandon all the Advantages it had gained; which unfortunately prevented the Marshal's Design, and obliged him to retreat to the Mountains, at the very Time that Prince Hildsburg-hausen arrived with the Infantry. The Prince immediately made himself Master of a Post at the Right, on the maintaining of which Post the Retreat entirely depended; there the Enemy



Enemy attack'd him several Times, but were always repulſed. The Turks have never been ſeen to make ſo continual and obſtinate a Fire as they did during the whole Day and Part of the Night. Prince Charles of Lorraine and Prince Waldeck maintained their Poſts ſeveral Hours againſt them. In the Night we retired into our old Camp, but cannot remain long there for Want of Forage. The Number of the killed and wounded is not yet known, becauſe the Liſts were not made out before the general Account of this Action was diſpatched to Vienna. Among the killed are General Larner, Count Caraffa, the young Prince of Waldeck, and (as is ſuppoſed) the Prince of Heſſe Rhinfelds; amongſt the wounded are the Prince of Waldeck and Count Daun.
