Leghorn, July 24.

THE Beginning of this Month arriv'd here his Britannick Majesty's Ship the Dolphin, Lord Aubrey Vere Commander, last from Genoa, from whence she brought the Earl of Pomfret and his Family, (who it is said design to pass some Time at Sienna) the Earl of Sandwich, and the Lord Charles Fitzroy. On the 7th came into this Port two of the Pope's Gallies, which had carried from Civita Vecchia to Genoa Sig. Oddi, the Pope's Nuncio to the Court of Portugal, who on the 27th past sail'd in an English Ship for Lisbon. The same Day arriv'd here from Genoa the Envoy of the States General, in his Way to the Court of Naples. We have an Account from Modena, that three French Gallies being appointed to sail from Marseilles to Antibes, to conduct from thence to Genoa the Dutchess of Modena, on her Return from Paris to Modena, the Duke had sent Count Guicciardi, a Gentleman of his Bedchamber, and an Officer of his Life-Guards, to attend her Highness at Genoa. On the 11th sail'd Westward the Dolphin, commanded by Lord Aubrey Vere. On the 15th M. de Wachtendonck reviewed the Regiment of Palavicini in the Presence of the Lord Pomfret, who on the 19th set out for Sienna.

Florence, July 27. A few Days ago an Order was published here, commanding all Persons possess'd of Lands in the Country, to set up Beehives, for increasing the Production of Wax and Honey, under a severe Penalty if the Order be not complied with in twelve Months. About 50 Families of Peasants are arriv'd here from Lorraine, in order to settle themselves in the Maremme of Sienna, and cultivate that Part of the Country which is mostly uninhabited; For their Encouragement, each Family is allow'd by the Government a certain Quantity of Ground with a few Cattle and other Things necessary for their Subsistence, till they can main-

tain themselves upon the Produce of their Settlements. On the 24th Sig. Caspari, the Great Duke's Commissary at War, set out from hence to review the Tuscan Garrisons at Pisa, Leghorn, Porto Ferrajo, and Grosseto. Several Pieces of Brass Cannon have been brought hither from Sienna and other Fortresses of this State, in order to be new cast.

Copenhagen, July 25, N. S. Count Danneskiold goes next Week to survey the new Works order'd at Gluckstadt, which are now almost finish'd.

Hambourg, Aug. 4, N. S. The Bishop of Lubeck, Duke Regent of Holstein, has his Residence at present at Kiel, and applies himself with great Assiduity to the Affairs under his Administration. His Highness has, with the Advice of his Privy-Council, lately made several Regulations, which are much approved of.

My Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty do hereby give Notice, That, in pursuance of His Majesty's Commission under the Great Seal, Letters of Marque or General Reprizals against the Ships, Goods, and Subjects of the King of Spain, are ready to be issued to any of His Majesty's Subjects, or others, who are willing to fit out any Ship or Kessel against Spain, and whom their Lordships shall deem fitly qualified for the same, upon their giving the usual Security, not to take, or any Ways molest, the Ships, Goods or Effects of the Subjects of His Majesty, or of His Allies.

His Majesty having been graciously pleas'd, by his Warrant under his Royal Sign Manual, dated the 10th of June, 1733, to establish certain Rules and Orders for the better Government of the Charity for the Relief of poor Widows of Commission and Warrant Officers of the Royal Navy: These are to give Notice, to all such Widows whose Husbands died on or since the 30th of August 1732, that Copies of the said Rules and Orders are lodg'd with the Commissioners of his Majesty's Navy at Chatham, Portsmouth, and Plymouth, as also with the Clerks of the Cheque at Deptford, Woolwich, and Sheerness; and with the Naval Officers at Harwich, Deal, and
