From the Camp of the Imperialists, July 25.

AFTER the Action at Kroska on the 22d Instant, we retired to the Camp at Zweybrucken where we had lain the Night before: We remained there the 23d; and at Noon were joyned by Count Neiperger's Body of Troops. The same Day a Council of War was held; some of the chief Officers were for marching back again, and offering the Enemy a second Battle; but considering the Want of Subsistence, it was thought better for the Army to retire into the Lines of Belgrade. The Names of the chief Officers who were killed or wounded in the Action at Kroska, are, the Lieutenant Field Marshal Baron Wittorf, the Majors General the Prince of Hesse Rhinfels, Count Caraffa, and M. Lersner; the Colonels Count Berthold, Minquitzburg, the Prince of Waldeck; the Lieutenant Colonels Mida, and the Marquis Litta; the Majors Count Lanthieri, and M. Palude, killed. The Lieutenant Field Marshal the Prince of Waldeck; the Majors General the Prince of Birckenfeld, Count Daun, Count Geisfuch, and M. Grune; the Colonels Dungen, Derthal, Wetzell, Villanova: The Lieutenant Colonels Count Wumbrand, Sonnau, the Prince of Baden Durlach, Radicati, the Count de Colowrat; the Majors Ullfeld, Levrier, Kleinholtz, and Sebottendorf, wounded. The Earl of Crawford, a Volunteer, wounded. The whole Loss of the Imperialists killed or wounded is computed at about 5000. Pursuant to the Resolution taken by the Council of War, on the 24th the Army came and encamped within the Lines of Belgrade; we saw no Enemy that Day. To Day, the 25th, the Enemy appeared upon the Hills of Winitza, over against our left Wing, and began to skirmish with our Hussars and Rascians, but with little Loss on either Side. General Pallavicini, who commands our Flotilla on the Danube, has been engaged with the Saicks and other Vessels of the Turks. We have no particular Account yet of his Proceedings, but we know that To-day he brought his Flotilla safe to Winitza, and is expected at Belgrade.

Vienna, Aug. 5, N. S. Our ordinary Advices from the Imperial Army commanded by Felt-Marshal Wallis, import, that on the 26th the whole Army passed the Danube over two Bridges, and incamped near the River Borza. The 28th at One in the Morning they march'd to the Semnitza, and pass'd over the Bridges and Causeways laid through the Morasses and on the Temes, and encamped at Jaboka. 8 or 9000 Turks appeared as if they designed to oppose their Passage, but did not attempt it, and only skirmish'd with the Hussars. Last Night an Estafette arriv'd here with Letters from Marshal Wallis, wherein he acquaints this Court, that having received

certain Intelligence of a Body of 30000 Turks being incamped at Panchova, he had on the 29th past come to a Resolution to dislodge them, and having the next Day march'd towards the Enemy, they came out of their Camp, drew up in two Lines after the European Manner, and engaging with great Fury, made an Opening in the Imperial Line, which however being immediately closed, he routed them entirely with a small Loss of Men on his Side, and of one Officer only. As it is difficult at all Times to know the Number of the dead and wounded on the Part of the Turks, it is only added, that half at least of their Camp was taken, and that it was owing to a violent Storm that he could not pursue them with the usual Advantages on such an Occasion. These Letters further add, that the Grand Visier had summon'd the Governour of Belgrade, and actually open'd the Siege in the Turkish Manner.

Whereas Informations has been lately received, that several Persons living in and near Brecknockshire, in South-Wales, have, for some Time past, made a Practice of counterfeiting the current Coin of this Kingdom; and whereas Thomas Pritchard, of the Parish of Talygarth, Yeoman, John Woodford of the same, William Lewis of the same, David Evan, commonly called Dray, and the Miller, of the Parish of Llanegery, and David Roffer, of the Parish of Cadixton near Neath, in the County of Glamorgan, who are suspected to have been guilty of the Crime aforesaid, have left their Habitations and absconded: His Majesty, for the better apprehending and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the Crime aforesaid, is pleas'd to promise his most gracious Pardon to any Person or Persons, who shall discover his or their Accomplices or Accomplishers, so as they, or any of them may be apprehended and convicted thereof. And as a further Encouragement to such Discoverers, his Majesty is also pleas'd to promise a Reward of One Hundred Pounds, over and above the Reward allowed by Act of Parliament for each of the said Offenders, to any Person or Persons who shall make the said Discovery, so that the said Offender, or any of them, may be apprehended and convicted as aforesaid.
