

tent of Ground on which they encamped appeared to be very numerous. At Noon, springing up a favourable Gale of Wind, which enabled our Vessels to use their Sails, and in the Evening we came up over against the Imperial Army; and kept coasting by them till they entered the Lines of Belgrade. In our Passage we fired continually at the Turkish Army where we judged our Guns would bear upon them, putting as close to the Shore as we could. Our Vessels fired in all about 500 Cannon-Shot, of which the Triton alone 171. General Pallavicini was honourably received by Felt-Marshal Wallis, who publickly declared that he was satisfied with his Conduct.

Whereas Information has been lately received, that several Persons living in and near Brecknockshire, in South-Wales, have, for some Time past, made a Practice of counterfeiting the current Coin of this Kingdom; And whereas Thomas Pritchard, of the Parish of Tal-gath, Yeoman, John Woodford of the same, William Lewis of the same, David Evan, commonly called David the Miller, of the Parish of Langeney, and David Roffer, of the Parish of Cadexton near Neath, in the County of Glamorgan, who are suspected to have been guilty of the Crime aforesaid, have left their Habitations and absconded: His Majesty, for the better apprehending and bringing to Justice the Persons concern'd in the Crime aforesaid, is pleas'd to promise his most gracious Pardon to any Person or Persons, who shall discover his or their Accomplice or Accomplices, so as they, or any of them may be apprehended and convicted thereof. And as a further Encouragement to such Discovery, his Majesty is also pleas'd to promise a Reward of One Hundred Pounds, over and above the Reward allowed by Act of Parliament for each of the said Offenders, to any Person or Persons that shall make the said Discovery, so that the said Offenders, or any of them, may be apprehended and convicted as aforesaid.

His Majesty having been graciously pleas'd, by his Warrant under his Royal Sign Manual, dated the 10th of June, 1733, to establish certain Rules and Orders for the better Government of the Charity for the Relief of poor Widows of Commission and Warrant Officers of the Royal Navy: These are to give Notice to all such Widows whose Husbands died on or since the 30th of August 1732, that Copies of the said Rules and Orders are lodg'd with the Commissioners of his Majesty's Navy at Chatham, Portsmouth, and Plymouth; as also with the Clerks of the Cheque at Deptford, Woolwich, and Sheerness; and with the Naval Officers at Harwich, Deal, and Kingsale; where they may be inform'd of all Particulars which entitle them to the Benefit of the said Charity, and receive the proper Certificates for that Pur-

But such Widows as live at too great a Distance from the Places above-mentioned, may apply by Letter to Thomas Corbett, Esq; at the Admiralty Office, who will send them all necessary Information. And the Governors of the said Charity intending to distribute to the Widows of such Sea Officers who died before the 30th of August 1732, and whose Circumstances come within the Rules of the Establishment, their Share of the Bounty granted by Parliament; these are to give Notice of the same to all such Widows, that they may procure the proper Certificates and Affidavits, and send or bring them hither. And the Court of Assistants do hereby give Notice, that they will meet at this Office on Tuesday the 11th of September next, at Eight o'Clock in the Morning, to receive the Claims of such Widows as shall be qualified according to the said Rules and Orders.
