*Stockholm, July 31.*

**T**HE Marquess d'Antin received on the 18th Instant a Present from the King of Sweden, consisting of two Diamond Rings, one for himself, and the other for his Lady, one valued at 4000, the other at 3000 Rixdollars, a Gold Snuff-box with a Brilliant in the Middle of the Lid, and a Sword with a Gold Hilt; the Amount of the whole reckoned at 10000 Crowns. The Marquess and his Officers who supped that Evening with their Swedish Majesties, took their Leave; the King of Sweden being to go the next Morning to Swartsio to take the Diversion of Shooting. On the 21st between Four and Five in the Morning the Marquess d'Antin made a Signal for weighing Anchor, and before Seven M. Barrail in the Fleuron, who had the Rear, was under Sail, but just by Wexholme his Ship struck against a Rock, and received such Damage, that the Marquess d'Antin sent to acquaint M. St. Severin the French Ambassadour here, that as there was no Port in Sweden but this and Carlscrona, where the Damage could be repair'd, he design'd to proceed on his Voyage, and hoped that the Fleuron would be allow'd to go into Carlscrona to refit. On the 25th arrived another Express from the Marquess d'Antin to M. St. Severin. The French Squadron was then but six Leagues off, and the Wind contrary; but the Fleuron had been so well repair'd, that it was hoped he was in a Condition to proceed on her Voyage without putting into Carlscrona, though the Ambassadour was still desired to procure a provisional Leave in Case of Necessity. The King of Sweden return'd the 24th to Carlberg from taking the Diversion of Shooting, and the next Night M. St. Severin and his Lady took Leave there of their Swedish Majesties. The Beginning of last Week General Cronstedt set out for his Command in Finland, and two Regiments sailed from Carlscrona the 13th with a fair Wind.

*From the Camp of the Imperialists near Haczey in Transylvania, Aug. 1.* We have received Advice at this Camp, that the Turks being informed we were on the March, under the Command of the Prince of Lobcowitz, towards the Bannat, drew together near Bukerest a Body of 8000 Men,

and went and attack'd a Fort which we have in Walachia called Perishan, and from the 26th of last Month fired upon it with five Pieces of Cannon; that they made three Assaults, in which they were bravely repulsed with great Loss by the Garrison commanded by General Piccolomini, and by the Lieutenant Colonel of the Regiment of Harrach, with no more Loss on our Side than of one Man. Precaution had been used to barricade all the Avenues to the Place by large Trees fell'd across them, and to post German Foot mixed with Heidukes Natives of the Country, to defend them; who all did their Duty perfectly well when the Turks attempted to force the Passages on the back of the Fort, beating them off with great Loss. The Garrison having afterwards made a Sally and being joynd by more of those Heidukes, routed the Turks intirely, took their Cannon, Baggage, their whole Camp, and their Provisions and Ammunition. General Piccolomini and the said Lieutenant Colonel, as well as the regular Forces and Militia, distinguished themselves very much on this Occasion.

*From the Imperial Army encamp'd at Jaboka, Aug. 5.* On the 2d Instant the Army rested in the Camp near Panchova, but at giving out the Word it was order'd that the same Evening the Baggage should be sent back to our former Camp at Jaboka. On the 3d the Army followed. Yesterday and to Day we lay still. The Enemy have not drawn together again, as it was reported they had, two Leagues beyond Panchova, their main Body keeping at Vipalanka: But they have sent out strong advanced Guards to Panchova, to observe our Motions: And we have Intelligence that they are resolv'd to return thither, and even to advance towards us. Marshal Wallis seems determin'd to wait their coming in this Camp, because it is most advantagiously situated.

*Vienna, Aug. 15, N. S.* By Letters from the Russian Army of the 23d past O. S. it is advised, that Marshal Munich had pass'd the Dniester with a very considerable Body that very Day, at or near a Place called Sinchova; where that River being nearer its Source, is more shallow than at Choczin: That the rest of the Army with the heavy Baggage under General Romanzoff was expected to pass also the same Evening: That Marshal Munich had immediately after his Passage sent out
