Petersbourg, September 15.

THE Czarina has given 4000 Rubles to Major General Apraxin, who brought the News of the Battle near Choczim, and of the taking of that Place, and has made him First Major of the Foot Guards, and a Knight of St. Alexander. Another Courier is arrived with Letters from Field-Marshal Munich, dated the 29th of August, importing, that he had passed the River Pruth, and was entred Moldavia, and had found in his March 42 Brass Cannon and 6 Mortars, that were left on the Road by the flying Turks.

Stockholm, Sept. 25. Mr. Burnaby, his Britannick Majesty's Secretary to this Court, arrived here the 22d Instant, and has notified his Arrival to all the Foreign Ministers here. The King of Sweden will go on the 27th to Suder Tellie, about three Miles off, to review the Regiment of Ostrogothia, and return the same Evening; in order to set out next Morning for Ekelfund, to review two other Regiments which are on their March to the Place where they are to embark. They will successively arrive at that Place from the 3d to the 10th of next Month, and set Sail as soon as the Wind serves for Finland.

Dresden, Oct. 4, N. S. By an Estaffette lately arrived, with Letters to Count Wratislau, and M. Keyserling, the Imperial and Russian Ministers, we are inform'd,

that a Peace was agreed on the 18th of September, N. S. at the Grand Vizier's Quarters before Belgrade, between the Czarina and the Porte, but have no Account of the Conditions. These Advices add, that Count Munich was arrived at Jassi. The Nobility of Masovia having assembled on the 14th of September at Warsaw, to elect Deputies to the Tribunal of Justice of the Crown, and nominate Commissaries for the Commission of the Treasure at Radom, (for both which Purposes Dietines have been held in other Palatinates and on the Crown Lands) the Adherents of the Confederacy of Braclau endeavour'd to exasperate their Countrymen against the neighbouring Powers, spirited thereto by a circular Letter from the Great Crown General, as Palatine of Kiow, to the Meetings of the Palatinates, setting forth the Damages committed by Foreign Troops in their Passage, notwithstanding the Neutrality of the Poles; and proposing to prevent the like, in Case the same Troops should repass through, or winter in Poland. This Letter being read, a Manifesto was proposed in this Assembly against such Proceedings, but rejected; and the Opinion of M. Riedfinski, Castellan of Czersk, agreed to, viz. That the King of Poland had already taken proper Measures in this Respect, pursuant to the Senatus Concilium at Fraustad, by sending Envoys (with proper Instructions) to the three Courts concern'd; and therefore it would conduce to the Preservation of the publick Tran-



Tranquillity, and not give any Umbrage to those Powers, that they should nominate Deputies from this Assembly to return his Majesty their Thanks for his paternal Care of the Welfare of the Kingdom. The like seditious Attempts have had no better Success in the other Dietines. Those of Cracow, Rava, and the Jurisdiction of Chelm, have held their Assemblies peaceably, and have already elected their Deputies to the Tribunal. The King of Poland is much better, and is to go to the Fair at Leipfick after his Birth-day, the 6th Instant, which will be kept at Hubertsberg. The Nuncio is to have an Audience this Day, the Pope being invited to be the first Sponsor to the Prince, who at his Sprinkling by the Nuncio, was named Clement, Wenceslaus, Hubert, Francis, Xavier.

Berlin, Oct. 10, N. S. The two French Ministers have been at Wusterhausen, where M. Vallory had his first Audience of the King and Queen of Prussia. The said Ministers staid there only one Night, and return'd the next Day to Town, and have since been entertain'd by most of the Officers of State.

Hambourg, Oct. 9, N. S. General Diemar arrived here last Night from Cassel, and intends to set out this Evening for Stockholm, in Company with Colonel Marchetti.

Hague, Oct. 13, N. S. His Excellency Horatio Walpole, Esq; his Britannick Majesty's Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary to the States General, has taken his Leave of their High Mightinesses, having this Morning presented his Recre- dential Letters in the usual Form to M.

Taminga, the President of the Week, Mr. Trevor, arrived at Helvoetsluys on Saturday last.

Dublin Castle, Sept. 29.

The Foot Forces in Garrison, with the Militia of the City, lined the Streets through which his Grace (attended by a Regiment of Horse, the Battle-Axe Guards, and the other Officers attending the State) proceeded, amidst the Acclamations of a vast Concours of People, to the Castle: Upon which the great Guns at the Barracks were fired, and answered by Volleys from the Regiments on Duty which were drawn out upon College-Green; and his Grace received the Compliments of the Nobility and other Persons of Distinction, upon his safe Arrival in this Kingdom.
