Letter from Field-Marshal Count Munich to the Duke of Courland, dated from the Camp beyond the Pruth, the 29th of August, O. S.

T HE happy Succeffes I am going to relate, muit be wholly afcribed to the Bleffing of Almighty God, to whom we have infinite Reafon to give the humbleft Thanks. It muft be acknowledged, that his Hand has guided all the Enterprizes of her Majefty our moft gracious Emprefs. The Pruth fhall be no longer named by Rutfians with Execration, but with Benediction, as opening the Way to a fpeedy and honourable Peace.

To draw in one Campaign, from the Don and the Donetz, from the Lines in the U-kraine, and from feveral Provinces far diffant from the Dnieper, an Army to meet together near Kiow; to pass with it the Dnieper, which had overflowed in an extraordinary Manner a German Mile in Breadth ; to march from the Frontiers of Ruffia to those of Moldavia, crofs Poland, without taking there the least Thing for our Carriages, or for Pro-visions; to pass the Bug, which the Enemy threatened to dispute with us; to pass even the Dniester without any Obstacle, though the Enemy were there with all their Forces; to make our Way over the Mountains of Choczim, and through the difficult Defilez near Tzorna-Ulze; to fend Parties, in Sight as one may fay of the Enemy, to drive to-gether Thousands of Horses, Cattle, and Sheep, in Moldavia, and bring them to that Side of the Pruth where we then lay; confequently to furnish the Army with what was wanting for our Carriages, and with Provi-fions, out of the Enemy's Country, without the Lofs of one Man; to repel with vilibly great Lois to the Enemy, all the Attacks of the Turks and Tartars; to beat out of a fortified Camp the Seraskier Sultan with all his Hords of Tartars, as also Koltschak Basha, with his Serdengetfies or Adventurers who profess neither to give nor take Quarter, and with his Lipkanes; laftly, to attack the Se-raskier Wely Bafhaw, who had the Com-mand of the Enemy's whole Army, amounting to 90000 Men, by whom we were furrounded on all Sides, and to give him a total Defeat ; to make a Booty in his fortified Camp, of all the Tents and Baggage, of 6 Mortars | don it.

and 42 Cannon of Brais, and all the Ammunition and Provisions, and to have but 70 Men on our Side killed or wounded; to take the important Fortrefs of Choczim, having for its Defence 157 Brafs Cannon, with Stores answerable; to make Prisoners of War a Bafhaw of Three Tails, and his Garrifon, without lighting one Match ; to purfue the Enemy to the Pruth, to pass that River with the Army, to build Forts on each Side of it; to fix a Footing in the Midft of the Enemy's Country, to chase the Hospodar of Moldavia from one End of it to the other, and make him fly to the other Side of the Danube; to levy Contributions, and take Provisions from the Enemy; to fee our Army with hardly one fick Person in it, in full Prof-perity and Abundance: All this, I fay, could not have happened, without being conducted and supported by the Hand of Almighty God. Much of these Events are Almighty God. Most of these Events are of fuch a Nature, that those who were not prefent at them may call many Particu-lars in Doubt, and among others this, that the Janiffaries approaching fiercely to make an Attack, were fuddenly ftopt by fo vigorous a Fire, that they had not Time to difcharge their Pieces or to handle their Sabres : The Fright of the Enemy was fuch, that a great Number of them were found drowned three Days after the Action fome Miles below the Station our Army was in, and the greatest Part of them fled as far as to the Danube, without daring to caft a Look behind them. On the other hand, never did Army ex-press more Ardour to fight, than ours. De-putations and Letters of Congratulation from Poland, have come to us one after another : And with the further Help of God, we cannot doubt of a very happy Islue of the Campaigne.

*Pctersbourg, Sept.* 19, O. S. On the 16th Initant this Court received Letters by an Exprefs from Vienna, with Advice that the Preliminaries of Peace between the Emperour and the Ottoman Porte were agreed and figned on the 21ft paft in the Turkifh Camp before Belgrade: This News gave the greater Surprize, becaufe Ruffia is not included in those Preliminaries. Immediately after the Arrival of the Express, this Court dispatched another to Field-Marshal Count Munich, who 'tis faid carries Orders to him to repass the Dniesser, and to demolish Choczim and abandon it.
