we not doubt to fee the Ambaffadors themfelves here in a very short time. The Treaty concluded between the . most Christian King and the Elector of Brandenburgh, is now made publick by both parties fo that it is not clear that the Dutch will be perfwaded of the truch of what hath been fo long reported concerning this Treaty. The Imperial Troops; under the Command of the Duke of Bournonville, not having been able to obtain of any of the Princes or States of the Empire, to quarter in their Territories, have been forced to return for Bohemia, where they at prefent are ; and though the Letters we receive from the Court at Vienna do not make any mention of their intending to remove as yet from thence, yet those we receive from Holland will affure us, that they are on their march this way again; It is faid here, that the most Christian King hath by his Minister at Vienna, represented to his Imperial Majesty, that in case he should cause his Troops, to march to the affiftance of the States General, during his being in a War with them, he should be obliged to take his measures accordingly. From Soeft we are from time to time told, that Monfieur de Tarenne will come down the Rhyne again towards Maestricht, but at the coming away of our last Letters, he was not yet broke up from thence. Yesterday the Duke de Chaulnes, and the reft of the French Plenipotentiaries arrived at Breuil from Aix 12 Chappelle, fo that they may now be here in a day or two at farthest. From Weltphalid they write, that the Bishop of Munster continues still at Coesvelt, and that he has a very confiderable Body of Men at prefent together, though as yet we hear of no action on that fide.

Swoll, May 26. All along the Dyke from Meppe to Wyck lies encamped 21 Troops of the Bishop of Munféers Horfe, and we are told of a confiderable Body of Men that are likewife come to Aelfelt, but are molt infantry: in like manner they are bringing their Forces on foot in other places, in order to their marching to the place appointed for the Rendezvous ; we cannot yet certainly Iearn, what defign those Troops will first take in hand, though the general opinion is, that they will fall into Friefland, which the Dutch feen very much to apprehend, and therefore have fent all the Force they could space, to joyn with the Forces of that Province, for their better defence. Prince Muwitz, to whom the States have committed the chief Command of their Forces there, is at present at Leewaerden, and omits no endeavors for the putting things in the belt posture he can ; though the generality of the Inhabitants feem mightily discouraged, and very diffident of their own ftrength.

Higue, May 29. Here is arrived an Envoy from the Duke of Lorraine, but not having as yet had Audience of the States, we are ignorant of his Errand. The Prince of Orange continues in the Leager yet fo, as to pais frequently from one place to another, to fee all things be in good order; and it is faid, that the feveral Posts on the Frontiers, are at present fo well proyided with all things necessary for their defence, that we do not much fear the Enemies attempting them. The French have used some endeavors to force us from our Post at Neversluys, but hitherto, without any great effect, though in truth they have not as yet feemed to have been in earneft, having onely fent out fmall parties rather to allarme us, and difcover the posture we were in, then with any farther defign. The Count de Monterey, Governor of the Spanish Neatherlands, bath lately fent feveral Expresses hithers to ac usint the States with the Motions of the French Arm and to defire them to affift him with what Force to ev can, to the end he may be in r condition of defe c>, if any thing extraordinary happen. It is still ver confident-reported here, that the Imperialista & being 24000

Men, Horle and Foot, belides 3000 of the Duke of Lograin's Troops, and the like number of the Elector of Saxony's, are on their march towards the Rbyne. London, May 26. The Hamphry and Elizabeth,

Captain Rob. Metford Commander, and the Surrat Merchant, Captain Francis Johnson, being arrived at Ptymonth from St. Helena, bring advice, That the faid Ship Humphrey and Elizabeth, which was fent forth in fuly last, by the Kaft India Company, with Souldiers, Ordnance, and Ammunition, for the Fortifying of that Ifland ; arrived there the 18 of November, and accordingly applied themselves to the planting of their Guns, and Fortifying of that Island, and putting it into a pollure of Defence; And that on the 20 of December following, there arrived in the Road of St. Helena, four of the Dutch Edit India Companies Ships, with above 600 Men, viz. the Frayhead. the Paulsbrooks, and the Gottenburgh, and one fmall Ship, which went out from the Neitherlands about April or May 1672, and coming to the uffial place of Landing, ingaged against the Fortifications and the Ship Humphrey and Eli[abeth (that lay in the Road) for fome hours together, but finding it too hot for them, declined that place, and attempted the Island in other places, and were beaten off feveral times, but on the 31 of December, and first of Fannary; they Landing about 400 Men in an unufual place, our Men being foent with continual watching and labour, the Enemy gained the Hills, and posselt themselves of the Island, our Fort not being Tenable to the Landward ; Whereupon the Governor of the Island, and People, Retreated on Board the Ship Humpbry and Elizabeth, and the Surat Merchant, which during the dispute, came into the Road in a weak condition, and alfo a French Ship from Bantam, which set fayl from St. Helena the first of finuary at night, and arrived at Plymouth the 22 of this instant.

Tarmouth, May 26. This afternoon came in here a Ketch, which attends upon the Koyal CFarles, the Mafler tells us, That he left His Majeflies Fleet yefferday about two in the morning, in a very good condition; That the Dutch Fleet lay then at Anchor off of the Weilings, about four Leagues from the Shore; that His Majeflies Fleet lay a League farther to Sea, in fight of them; and that they had had very bad weather fince their being on that Coalt.
