He Envoy arrived here from Muscovy, had yesterday Audience of the King, at which time he delivered to him a Letter from the Czar his Master, consisting of five theets of Parchment, in which that Prince at large declares, the inducement he has to enter into a War against the Turks, and that being resolved himself to march at the Head of a powerful Army against the common Enemy of Christen ome, he hath declared his intentions to all the Princes thereof, that they may joyn with him, and particularly to this Crown, as well because of the ancient friendship and alliance between them, as the common interest they have to abate the power of the Turks; The answer the Envoy has as yet received is, that the King will confult with the Senate, concerning what the Czar has written and that he will in few days dispatch him with an ample answer to the same. In the mean time we feem not to be at present in so much danger of an Invasion by the Turks, as some Months since, the great reports of the Grand Visiers preparations beginning to fessen, and our Letters from the Port telling us, that he will not take the Field till towards Autumne. are affered that an Ambaffador is coming hither from the King of Persia, to propose likewise an Alliance there are at present onely 5000 Men, and that they are so far from any thoughts of invading us, that they greatly fear our Forces will draw that way, and make an attempt upon that place. The King has made his Cousin Duke Constantin Wisnowitsky, Palatine of Podolia, which Government was become voyd,

Vienna, May 21. All the General Officers of the Imperial Army are returned hither; on Tuesday last came to Town the Prince of Lorrain, as likewise the Count de Caprara, and this evening we expect here the Duke of Bournonville; by which it appears, how ill-grounded the reports of the Imperialits being returning towards the Rhyne have been. The Envoye of the Czar of Muscowy is preparing for his departure, to morrow he will have his dispatches, and then begin his journey for Venice, from whence he is to pass on to Rome. Yesterday arrived here the Marquis de Grana from Cologne; and this day the Minister residing here on the part of the Elector of Brandenburgh, acquainted his Imperial Majesty with his Masters proceeding, in relation to his Treaty with the most Christian King, which hath much disturbed the Councils of this Court.

Genoua, May 24. This State is fending an Extraor. dinary Envoy to the most Christian King, on occasion of their Galley having been stopped and carried up to Marfeilles, though it issaid, that Monsieur Gaumont the French Minister here, has promised the Senate that the faid Galley shall be forthwith restored; The Dutch Privateer the Dolphin, which hath occasioned all this, is at present seifed by order of the Vice-Roy of Naples, in some Port of that Kingdom.

Hambrough, May 26. Our last advices from Stock holm told us, that three Rogiments, confisting each of 2000 Men, were Commanded to march forthwith for

Gottenburgh, and there to embark for the River Elbe. where they are to land at Staadt in the Dutchy of Bremen. Most of the Troops which have of late passed this way, and were faid to be raifed by Commission of the Swedes, are now faid to have been upon account of the States, and that the Officers made use onely of this pretext, to raise their Men. We hear that the Cessation of Arms has been published in all the Territories of the Elector of Brandenburgh, with the French, the Elector, of Cologne, and the Bishop of Munster, in pursuance of the Treaty lately concluded with them.

Cologne, May 30. The Duke of Chaulnes and Mon-

fieur Courtin the French Plenipotentiaries for the Treaty of Peace, are at present at Brenil; on Sunday last their Excellencies came hither, but returned again in the Evening; It is faid here, that on Friday next they will make their publick Entry into this place. From Coblenty they write, that 1500 Imperialifts were arrived there and at Erbersteyn, with intentions to continue in Garrison in those two places. We have advice, that 5000 Brench Horse have lately passed through the Countrey of Juliers, towards their Conquests in the United Provinces. Monsieur de Turenne will now certainly remove in few days out of the County of Mark, and take his way towards the Countrey of Liege, where it is faid, he is to joyn with fuch other Forces as shall come from Charleroy, in order to their attacking Maestricht, though there be some who report with much confidence, that he will march up tocontents and Francfort, to secure the passage of the Moselle; however, a short time will now true ly informus.

From the French Camp at Gaure, May 36. Yester-

day his Majesty, after having ordered the Di ke of Orheans to re-pass the Vaert at Ghent, with the Troops under his Command, parted early in the Morning from Landerhamme, a League from Ghent; and having passed the Lis upon Bridges made of Boars at Duerte, between Ghent and St. Dennis, and afterwards l'E[caut near this place, Encamped here, which is a Principality of the Count d'Egmont. This Morning by break of day his Majesty removed from hence, with intentions to lodge at Busselveck, and to march to morrow to Alost, which is about five or six Leagues from Bruffets.

Brussels, June 3. Wer leve not without a general disorder, seen the most Christian King with his Army within two or three Leagues from this place; yesterday his Majesty, after having quitted the Countrey of Alost, passed the Senne, which runs through this City, at Ruysbroeck, two Leagues from hence; it is said that his Majesty takes his may towards Haecht, between Malines and Aerschot, where he will pass the Demer, and con-tinue his march towards the Territories of the States General: the march of these Troopshas extreamly ru-ined the Countrey. The Count de Monterey is at prefent at Antwerp, where it is thought he will continue till the French are removed out of our Territories, which we now hope to fee in a day or two.

Hagne, June 3. As yet the Enemy hath not attacked any of our Places, which some attribute to the ind disposition of the Prince of Conde, who hath been much troubled with the Gour, but we say here, that
