Copenhagen, Nov. 24, N. S.

BARON Dehn, appointed Envoy Extraordinary to the Court of Spain, is come hither to receive his Instructions, and proposes to set out by the Middle of next Month. M. l'Abbé le Maire, who has the Care of the French King's Affairs at this Court, appear'd Yesterday for the first Time at Court, and being presented by the Grand Marshal in the Circle, deliver'd his Credential Letter to the King of Denmark. He was afterwards conducted to the Queen's Apartment; and as she never appears in a publick Circle, he had a private Audience of her Majesty. Count Daneskiold Samsøe, who has hitherto had only a Superintendency of the Fleet and Marine Affairs, is now invested with the chief Military Command in that Service, and is to enjoy all the Emoluments, Honours and Power, which were formerly possessed by his Uncle the High Admiral Guldenliou, except the Title.

Copenhagen, Dec. 1, N. S. The Birth-Days of their Danish Majesties, which come with the Interval of one Day only betwixt them, are just now over. They were not celebrated this Year at Court, but several Entertainments were given on those Occasions by the Ministers of the Council and others in Town. Among the Promotions, which were all made on the Queen's Birthday the 28th past, these only are of Note, General Lewenoern had the Blew Ribbon; Baron Dehn appointed Envoy to Spain, and Baron Reitzenstein, Marshal of the Court, received the White Ribbon.

Whereas it has been represented to His Majesty, That the Body of John Davies, of Monmouth, Glazier, was on Wednesday the 14th Instant November, discovered in the River Wye, near the said Town, and being taken up, several large Wounds appeared on his Head, from whence there is great Reason to believe, that he was murdered, and then thrown into the said River; and whereas the Body was viewed by the Coroner, and a Jury being summoned by him, they brought in their Verdict, that the Deceased was murdered by Persons unknown: His Majesty, for the better Discovery of the Persons concerned in this Murder, is pleased to promise

his most gracious Pardon to any one of them, (except the Person that murdered the said John Davies) who shall discover his Accomplice or Accomplices, so as they or any of them may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
