THEIR Sicilian Majesties returned last Week from the Island of Procyta in perfect Health. No Privateers under Spanish Colours have been, or will be permitted, even to harbour in any of the Ports of the two Sicilies, much less to fit out from them. It is said, that the Form of the Regulation of this Port, as Neutral, will be publish'd in a few Days. A Catalan Bark, which had boarded a Dutch Ship, and afterwards put into Baia, was ordered by the Marquis de Salas, to depart immediately for the Coast of Spain, and not to attempt any Captures in these Seas.

Lisbon, Nov. 27, N. S. By Letters of the 15th Instant we have an Account, that the Court of Spain have given Orders to prohibit all English Manufactures and Provisions, although in neutral Bottoms: And that three or four small Boats which went from Faro with Butter, Leather, &c. were lately seized at Huelva. This Prohibition extends to all British and Irish Commodities whatsoever, as well Provisions of all Kinds, and Fish from Newfoundland, as the Manufactures of the Country.
