Petersbourg, November 24.

THE foremost Body of the Troops which are returning from Walachia, is expected in the Neighbourhood of Kiow by the End of this Month. It being unnecessary, since the Conclusion of Peace with the Turks, to post so great a Number of Men in the Lines of the Ukraine, as in preceeding Years; the greatest Part of the Armies commanded by General Lacy and Count Munich will have their Winter Quarters assigned them in the Provinces of this Empire which lye towards the Baltick; so that next Spring, if the Circumstances of Affairs should require it, an Army of 80000 Men may be drawn together on the Frontiers of Finland, and one of 60000 in Livonia. Provisions for subsisting such great Numbers, are already brought into the Czarina's Magazines.

Berlin, Dec. 12, N. S. Preparations are making for the Reception and Entertainment of the Court of Wolfenbuttel, which is expected here some Day next Week. An Incident happen'd a few Days ago at Francfort on the Oder, which makes not a little Noise here. Nine Soldiers, all English, belonging to General Schwerin's Regiment, which is quarter'd in that Town, form'd a Design to desert, which they executed by forcing, Sword in Hand, the Guard at one of the Gates. The Commandant being in Doubt whether a greater Number was not concerned in the same Design, did not think proper to order a Detachment to go in Pursuit of them, but sent two Officers on Horseback, who were directed to try if they could bring them back by gentle Representations and Promises of Pardon. The said Officers overtook the Deserters at half a Mile's Distance from the Town, and after they had spoke to them, finding their Persuasions had no Effect, they rode up to some neighbouring Villages, and brought with them a great Number of Boors armed. The Deserters not discouraged at this, put themselves in a Posture of Defence, and engaged with the Boors, of whom they killed several, and mortally wounded one of the Officers who headed them; but being at last overpowered by Numbers, and five of the Soldiers being mortally wounded, they were forced to surrender; and we since hear that three of them were to be shot as Yesterday or this Morning.

Hague, Dec. 15, N. S. The Deputies of several Towns who had returned home during the late Adjournment, being returned, the States of Holland met on the 10th Instant, and resumed their Deliberations upon the Question of augmenting their Forces.
