## A PROCLAMATION,

For encouraging Seamen to enter themselves on board His Majesty's Ships of War.

GEORGE R.

HEREAS it is our Royal Intention to give all due Encouragement to all such Seamen, who shall voluntarily enter themselves in our Service; We have thought fit, by and with the Advice of our Privy Council, to publish this our Royal Proclamation; and we do hereby promise and declare, That all such able Seamen, not above the Age of Fifty-five, nor under the Age of eighteen Years, fit for our Service, who shall in Great Britain, on or before the Fifteenth Day of March next, voluntarily enter themselves to serve in our Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of our Ships, or the chief Offi-cers on board such Tenders as shall be em-ployed for raising Men for the Service of our Navy, or with any Justice of Peace or chief Magistrate of any City or Town, shall receive, as our Royal Bounty, the Sum of two Guineas each Man; and all such ordinary Seamen fit for our Service, who shall so enter themselves, as aforesaid, shall receive the Sum of thirty Shillings each Man, as our Royal Bounty; fuch respective Sums to be paid them by the respective Clerks of the Check residing at the Ports or Places where the Ships into which they shall be entered shall be, immediately after the second Muster of such Seamen: And we do hereby further promise and declare, That all such Seamen, who shall so voluntarily enter themselves, as aforesaid, shall be affured of receiving Six Months Pay, although there shall happen to be no Occasion for their Service so long. And we do hereby require and direct, That if any such Seamen shall voluntarily enter themselves within the Time before mentioned with any Officer, Justice of Peace, or chief Magistrate, as aforesaid, such Officer, Justice of the Peace, or chief Magi-firate respectively, shall give to each Man so entering, a Certificate under his Hand and Seal (without Fee or Reward) of his Entry, and the Time of fuch Entry, and shall thereby limit fuch Number of Days, not exceeding

ten, as may be necessary for his repairing on board; and in which Certificates they are to infert the Names of the Persons so entering, and to describe their Persons and Ages, and to mention therein the Time allowed them to repair on board our faid Ships. And we do hereby declare, That all such Seamen, who on or before the faid Fifteenth Day of March next, shall voluntarily enter themselves, as aforesaid, and shall within the Time limited and appointed in fuch their Certificates repair on board and remain in any of our faid Ships and Vessels, shall be entitled to the Benefit of our said Royal Promise, as aforefaid, and not otherwise; and in such Case every such Seaman shall be entitled to his Pay from the Time of his being first entered, as And we do hereby require and aforelaid. command all Persons whatsoever that may be authorized or impowered to impress Mariners for our Service, that they do not impress or molest any such Seamen to whom such Certificate, as aforefaid, shall be given, according to the true Intent and Meaning of this our Royal Proclamation, or any Men now ih our Service, who, by Tickets figned by the Captains of our Ships or Vessels to which they belong, have or shall have Leave to be abfent from their Duty for any Time not exceeding twelve Days, before which Time they shall not fail to render themselves on board our said Ships or Vessels whereto they shall belong, according to the Time limited by such their Certificates or Tickets: And to the End we may be truly informed what Persons shall so enter and render themselves to serve on board our Royal Navy, in Pursuance of this our Royal Proclamation, we do hereby require and command our respective Captains, Lieutenants, and chief Officers, commanding any of our Ships of War, or other our Ships of Vessels aforesaid, and also all Justices of the Peace and chief Magistrates within Great Britain, to transmit to the principal Officers and Commissioners of our Navy exact Lists and Accounts of the Names, Ages, and Descriptions of the Persons, who shall voluntarily enter themselves with them, and the Times when, and Places where, and of the Times which shall be allowed them respectively for rendering themselves on board, and of the Times of their respective repairing.

on board any of our faid Ships or Veffels. And we do hereby require and command the faid Seamen to repair on board their respective Ships or Vessels on which they shall so enter themselves, or to which they shall belong, within the Times limited by such Certificates or Tickets, on Pain of our highest Displeasure. And we are also graciously plea-fed to declare, That Conduct-Money, accor-ding to the Practice of the Navy, shall be allowed to all fuch Seamen fo voluntarily entering and rendering themselves on board, according to the true Meaning of this our Royal Proclamation. And we do hereby further declare, That if fuch Men in our faid Service, who are or shall be permitted to be absent by such Tickets, as aforesaid, do not repair on board their respective Ships or Veffels by the Time allowed by fuch Tickets, they shall not only be liable to be impressed, but to suffer such further Punishment as by Law may be inflicted on them for such their Neglect. And we do hereby also strictly command all the Captains and Officers of our Ships, and others imployed in the impressing of Men for our Fleet, that they take particular Care not to impress or entertain any Persons whatsoever, who shall not be fitly qualified to serve in our Royal Navy; and for preventing of any Deceits or Abuses which may happen by any Person or Persons leaving the Ships to which they belong, and entering him or themselves on board any other of our Ships, as aforesaid, in order to obtain the Bounty money herein before granted, we do hereby direct, declare, and command, that such Seamen belonging to any of our Ships or Vessels whatsoever, as shall absent themselves from any of the Ships or Vessels to which they shall belong, and shall enter themselves on board any other of our Ships, in order to obtain the faid Bountymoney, shall not only lose the Wages due to him in the Ships they shall so leave, but also be severely punished according to their Demerits. And whereas it hath been often found, that in Time of War great Numbers of Seamen, and also of Watermen, Bargemen, and Lightermen fit for our Sea Service, have left the usual Places of their Abode, and have removed themselves into private and obscure Places, endeavouring thereby to avoid the publick Service, when there is the greatest Occasion for them; we do hereby require and command all our Justices of the Peace, Mayors, Bailiss, Magistrates, Constables, and other Officers, that they not only give all necessary Assistance to our Officers imployed in impressing as aforesaid, but that they do use their utmost Endeavours to discover, secure, and send to some near Sea-port Town, all such Seamen, Watermen, Bargemen, and Lightermen, fit for our Service, as shall after the said Fisteenth of March be found to ablconding, or straggling abroad from their usual Places of Abode, and more especially in the Roads from any Seaport Town to London, in order to their being put on board our Fleet in our Service, and that of what they shall do therein, they from Time to Time fend an Account to the

Commissioners of our Navy. And we do hereby direct the respective Officers of our Fleet, who shall receive such Seamen, Watermen, Bargemen, and Lightermen, to give Receipts for them, therein expressing the Names of such Men, and on board what Ship or Veisel, and the Time when, and Place where they are received. And the Commissioners of our Navy are hereby directed, upon producing (at any Port where there are Officers immediately under their Directions) the faid Receipts, to pay to the Person producing the same, Twenty Shillings for each Man, and Sixpence per Man for each Mile he shall be brought, if under Twenty Miles, and Ten Shillings for each Man that shall be brought above Twenty Miles, over and besides the said Twenty Shillings. And we do hereby declare, that no Protection of any Man, in any Ships or Vessels imployed in the River, or on the Coast, by the Commissioners of our Navy, Ordnance, Victualling, and Customs, shall be in Force for more than Six Months from the Date thereof, except such as shall be figned by our Lords Commissioners of our Admiralty. And we further direct, That in all Protections, the Persons be not only named, but described by their Place of Residence and Imployment, and Service for which they are protected; and that any of them who shall be found upon the Water in any other Service than what they were protected for, shall lose the Benefit of their Protection, except the Watermen belonging to us and our Royal Family, the Admiralty, Victualling, Ordnance, and Customs. And we do hereby require and command our Commissioners of our Navy, Ordnance, Victualling, and Customs, that they do not protect more Men than their Service absolutely requires, and to renew all their Protections within their Reach by the End of the faid Time limited for Bounty-money, and to revoke all Protections by them, or any of them granted respectively, so soon as the Service is over, for which the same respectively were or shall be granted. And for encouraging Persons to discover Seamen, Watermen, Lightermen, and Bargemen, who shall abscond or secrete themselves, as aforefaid, we do hereby promise and declare, that for every such Man, who after the said Fifteenth Day of March next, shall be so discovered and brought on board of our Ships of War, or Tenders, for the Receipt of Seamen, the Person so discovering them shall receive the Sum of Two Guineas for every able Seaman, and Thirty Shillings for every ordinary Seaman, from our Commissioners of our Navy, or the Naval Officer at the Port where he shall be brought, or if there shall be no Naval Officer, from the Collector of the Customs there.
