Petersbourg, January 22.

THIS Court is in daily Expectation of the Ratification of the Peace from Constantinople Choczim is delivered up to the Turks. Neither of the Felt-Marshals Munich or Lacy, are as yet arrived at this Place.

Stockholm, Jan. 29. The Intenseness of the Cold in these Parts has froze the Seas between Zealand and Schonen, so that the heaviest Carriages may pass over the Ice between Copenhagen and Malmuyer. The King and Senate have not yet determined whether there shall be a Diet or not this Spring.

Copenhagen, Feb. 13. Count Reufs, Brother-in-Law to Count Lynar, M. Often Bailiff of Sora, and Major-General Rappe who resides in Norway, have received the Honour of the White Ribbon. It is said Count Lynar will be recalled from Stockholm, and is expected here about Easter, and that he is to change Stations with M. Bernsdorff at Ratibon. Count Lewenhoren has been dangerously ill for some Time; but his Fever having now left him, there is a Likelihood of his doing well.
