HE Polish Emissary, who was sent into Tartary to reclaim the Prifoners taken by the Cham's Troops in their last Incursions into Poland against the Russians, reports, that there is likely to be Troubles in the Crimea among Count Fleming, the Tartars themselves. Great Master of the Artillery of Lithuania, had an Audience of Leave to Day of their Polish Majesties, and this Evening sets out on his Return to Lithuania, but is to go to the Court of Berlin in his Way. We have had excessive cold Weather almost four Months, the like never known in this Country before. The 25th Instant the Duke of Saxe-Weissensels arrived here, being invited by his Polish Majesty to partake of some extraordinary Diversions with which the Carnaval is to close.

Vienna, Feb. 20. On the 11th Instant a Courier arrived from Rome, with an Account, that Pope Clement XII. died on the 6th Instant. His Name was Laurence Corsini, defcended of an ancient and illustrious Family of Florence, of which Family was Andrew Corsini Bishop of Fiesole, who died in 1373, and was canonized in 1629, by Urban VIII. There were also two Cardinals of the same Family, the one named Peter Corfini, who died in 1405, the other Nereo Corsini, who died in 1678. The said Laurence Corsini was born on the 17th of April 1652. On the 17th of May 1706, he was made a Cardinal by Clement XI. and upon the Death of Benedict XIII. was chosen Pope on the 12th of July 1730. Our Cardinal Archbishop Count Colonitz is on his Departure from hence for Rome, to affift in the Conclave which is to be held for chuling a new Pope; and an Express having been dispatch'd to Cardinal Sinzendorf at Breslau, he is daily expected here on his Way to Rome upon the same Occasion. The Season is very rigorous here, with frequent Snows and hard Frosts, so that for several Weeks past the Danube has been frozen over in this Neighbourhood; and by Means of the deep Snows the Streets of this City are hardly passable.
