West-Comes, Aug. 11. On Tuesday last three ships were brought in by the Enoch Ketch: The Grand of Oftend: The St. Mary of Bridges: And the St. Anne of Newport, all of them lacen with Wine and Brandy from Bourdeaux.

Tarmouth, August 13. Yesterday came into our Roades two great Fly-boots of 400 Tuns butthen, taken by the Dragon, but brought in by the John and Thomas, a Kings Mm of War, who touched here to land some fick and wounded men, and with his prizes is gone for London

Plymouth, August 12. This cay arrived a Merchant from Lisbon, in his way he citic vered about twenty or thirty French Men of War, which were making for Rochelle, but his Vessel being nimble, kencout of their reach.

Paris, August 17. From Basil in Switzerland we are advised, That the Allembly of the Hi teen Cantons was broken up, having dere two things very temarkable. First, To take the France Comte in e treie I' en Cien ngaint whomsoever. The second to relieve their lare A starte with France to be sul, unleis the King shall before Christmas pay down the 22 Millions e one them, of which, five is due to that of Berne alone. And its fail, the Emperor and King of Spain have prefented each of those Deputies with Gold Chains of Bood value. Which hath been much reflected on here, and immediately the Officers of that Nation have underhand had a good part of it ei. arrears paid them.

There are some reports, that the Queen of Portugallanded at Lub n the 24 paff, and that our Fleet hath been feen on their way towards these Coasts, as far as the Groyne: But in a very ill con..ition, the ships soul, the men sickly, several of the best Captains deat, and thee Vessels employed as Hospitals to the rest. Oir Gailies are in the same state in the Mediterranean, the Marquels de Termes, Lieutenant General, and several other principal Officers dead: Two of the Gallies re-

nured full of fick men into Provence.

Whitekal, Aug, 14. This day was with much devotion kept a day of S lemn Thank living for the fignal Victory it pleased God levely to give His Majesties Fleet over the Durch: The R verend D. Dolben, Clerk of the Closetto His Mejeffy, and D an of Westminster, having made an excellen Sermon tefore His Majeffy upon that occasion, Which by His Majesties essocial Command is to be made Publick.

Whitehal, Aug. 15. Las Night arrived here in Post Sir Philip H ward, dispatched Express from Hir Majestics Fleet off the Ulic, with a full account from his Highness Prince Rupert, and his Grace the Puke of Aloc-marle, of the late happy Success of Sir Robert Ho'mes his Expedition, in the burning and destroying more than 150 of the Exemies ships in the Ulie; as also of the Town of Bandaris on the Island of Schelling, confisting of about 1000 Houses, of which you will see elsewhere a Particular. In the mean time, you have the Sum of this glorious Success in the following Letter from Sir Robert Holmes his own kand.

Being ordered on Tuesday night last, by his Highness, and his G ace, to go into the Ulie, to burn that Island; in order thereunto, on Thursday morning I got into the Channel, and being in Schelling Road, could espie a great Fleet, consisting of about 170 Sail, small and great, at Anchor in Allie Road: I conceived it might be very good service to defivoy them, and understanding there were not many men of War amongst them, and seeing that they rid very thick, I supposed it might be the sooner performed ; I went therefore in with five Firehips, some Ketches, and one Fifth-rate Fregat, leaving some other Fregats in Schelling Road. I fent the Firefnips a head, who foon burned two men of War, and cther ships that stood desenting the whole Fleet; and immediately sent all my Boars to burn the rest of the ships, which they did with so good success, that in a short time the most of that great Fleet was in a flame, except a Guinny man of 24 Guns, and three small Privateers, that getting together in the Narrow of the Channel, protected five Sail more that were got a head of them, so that our Boats could not possibly come

as them 3 and the most of our Ketches being on ground, which hindred also the landing of our men upon the Illie; which notwithstanding we resolved to do the next morning, and had accordingly proceeded in it, bad not in the Night a Gulf happened with fo much Rain, that spoiled a great many of our mers Arms and Ammunition on board the Hoyes, Ketches and Boats: However, I went with Eleven Companies on shore upon the Schelling, where we saw some scattering Fellows, but met with no great opposition; I burned the chief Town upon that Island, which, by all the Relation I could get, was very Rich, I had burnt all the Villages there, but that it was almost High-water; and could not lese that opportunity of getting out again to Sea, which I thought to be more conhiderable, than to flay 24 hours at least, to demolish one or two small inconsiderable Villages; and the Channel between the Broyes very narrow, and not bold without a sank wind. I cannot give an exact Account of what damage the Dutch might suffain by us, but certainly it must be great. I suppose we may hereafter have a more full Account of that from amsterdam . Ou own loss was not very confiderable, having not above 12 men killed and wounded. The number of the flips burns, I suppose to be between 150, and 160 Sails Upon the Schelling I kept with five Companies on the skirts of the Town, left any Enemy flicul: furprize vs, whil'll I fent five Companies more to bu n it, leaving one Company to fecure our Bosts ; whom finding too flow in executing dist Office, I was forced to let fire on some of the houses to the winaward of the Town, to occasion the hastning of our men avvay ; which ook to good effect, that in helf an hours time the most part of the Toven was in a flame, otherwise it would have been a hard task to get our men avvay fo fuddenly.

The Tyger, Afficiance, Dragon, Farland, and Sweepstakes, left in skelling-Road: The Pembroke and, five Fireships, with three Keiches and B ais, went in upon the Facet that rode acthe 111y; the little Veffel that belongs to Prince Rupert, called the Fanfan, Sir Kobert Holmes went in himlelf.

a Company under him, were Sir Robert Holmes with his own Company.

Sir Philip Howard with a Company of Volunteers.

These Eleven Companies consisted of Twelve hundred men or apwards.

This is the sum of this great and memorable Action, the weight of which will be best learnt from Holland where it isfelt: On our side we can onely observe in it a Wise and prudent Counsell seasonably taken, and most vigorously executed; the whole by the bleffing of God attended with admirable success, without any confideral le less in the attempt, the several Officers and Commanders in the occasion, bringing home a just reward of Glory and Reputation; and the common Seamen and Soldiers their packed well lined with Duckets and other rich spoil, which was found in great plenty, as well on board the Merchants folios, as in the Town they burnt, and was freely abandoned to them.
