Madrid, June 7. He Comte de Lion is arrived here from his most Christian Majesty, with the Complement of Condolance upon the death of the Emples, having received his eight days Enter imment at this Kings Expences, as traor mary. We hear from the Groin, Envoy Extraor inary. that creal En lith Prizes had been brought into that fort be the Dutch Privateers, From Malaga of the 9 pat That a 1 sle Argier Ship had ta-ken a Venetian trut had oo Spanish Souldiers, Women and Children a board, and above 70 thousand pieces of Eight in Silver, with much tich Merchan life. Twas reported, that Gillan profeers, and would probably make himself Mader of Fezin a thort time, and that then Sally promises to come under his Com 1and, That the Tizer Frigat which was arrived in that Port, had Order to bring his Wives and Houshold from Argier to Tangier, for which place he professes great kindness. From the same place the 30 pair, That by the Concord arrived there from Alicant, they had news of the French having taken a rich Genouele Convoy, because that Republick had permitted the Dutch to Arm in Genoua, contrary to their Engagement to his most Christian Majesty. From Gadie the 7 past, That Monsseur d'Almeras with six men of War, and two ships, arrived in that Bay two days before. He satured the Town with II Guns, and was answered with 7, but the Royal Armada gave him none, in return of the same number which he gave them as to the Town, pretending that he ought to have lower'd his Flag, in fight of the Stanuard Royal of Spain. That about the same time arrived there three Mayorca Ships with 700 Neopolican Souldiers, which were to pass for Flanders in a few days in two Oftend Frigats. From the same place the 14 pall, That he Royal Armada thought it at length convenient to make a return of 7 Guns to the French Squadr n, which they did the next day, after Monfieur d'Almeras arrival; That those French men of War are to emain cruifing on that Coast. From the same place the 23 past, That there was in that River, a French man of War, who came in to get a new main Top Mait, and reported, that Monsieur Chasternaut was cruifing on hat Coast, with a Squadron of 7 Ships, of which that Vest'l was one.

Rome, fune 3. On Munday last was held a Consiflory, wher his Holiness was present, appearing very firong and vigorous, to the great wonderment of all the Congregation, confidering his great age, and the continual indisposition he hath of late had upon him; fome were of opinion, that the Pope would in his Confistory, have proceeded to a nomination of Cardinals, but it feems that is still deferred, contrary to the expectation o' many; the 200000 Crowns which his Holiness so ne time since fint to the King of Paland, to be employed for the defence of that Kingdom against the Turks, remains still, as we re told, in the hands of our Nuncio at that Court, on what account we know not; but this week we are told of Letters arrived from that King to the Pope, in which, he defires his Holiness to complex his good intentions to that Crown and to give order for the payment of this Money. The Cardinal Brancacci continues still very

ill, insomuch that his recovery is despaired of by many. The Bishop of Marseilles, who lately arrived here from Florence, whither he was sont by the most Christian Ring to compose some misunderstandings at that Court, is gone hence again on his way home. It is said, that the Duke de Gravina hath, for some particular reasons, desired to be excused some vertorming the Ceremony of doing homage on St. Peters day, on the part of the Crown of Spiin; and that Father Nithard, the Spanish Ambassador, very much resents this resulfal.

Genoua, June 7. The two French men of War, continue to take all such Genousse Vessels as they can meet withal; and we hear of two that have some days since fallen into their hands. This Senate hath not as yet as we can hear of, taken any resolution for the composing the differences, which has occasioned this Scisure of our Ships by the French. This States Admiral Ship is careening here, and so soon as ready, will sayl for Spain, to meet our Convoy which is coming from thence, so that they may be the better able to make their desence, in case of any accident. The French Galleys are at present at Monaco, and some tell us, will come hither. This State seems at present disposed give his Holiness satisfaction in the matter of I recedency, between the Duke and the Atchbishop of this place.

Colo ne, June 16. The 13 instant Sir Liouel Jenkins and Sir Joseph Williamson, the English Plenipotentiaris arrived here; the Harl of Suplerland, being a well ar, still detained by his Indisposition at Paris. The same evering the Dutch Plenipotent

Antwerp, fune 20. You may casily imagine what news we have here from H llan l, concerning the late Engagement, the advices we receive from thence on fuch occasions, always agreeing in the main point, viz. That they have obtained a great Victory, as they do at this time, thoughth appears no other proof of it, then that they are pleased to tell us so; The French carry on the Siege of Macsiricht with a great deal of earnestnes, they have, its faid, finitned their Batteries, and this day they intended to begin to make use of their Cannon. The Count de Mont r y has lately received, as we are told 600000 Crowns by Bills of Exchange fi m Madrid, part of which he will imploy to-wards payment of the Militia. The States of Holland have fent his Excellency an account of the late Engagements, which we do not see made publick, and therefore may well conclude, it is not the fame that is published in Holland. Our Letters from Lipstadt of the 13 instant, tell us, That Monsieur de Turenne was broken up with the Forces under his Command, from his Quarters in the County of Mark, and that he took his march down the Rhyne towards Maestricht, to assist at the Siege of that place. The Durch continue to write of the coming down of the Imperialists, but our last Letters from Vienna, said, they lay then in their Quatters near Egra in Bohemig.
